DEATH OF JOHN SIPE AT THURSTON

(Special Correspondence.)
Thurston, Jan. 15.—Once more the people at Thurston have been called to pay their respects to one of their fellow neighbors and citizens. On last Saturday, January 11, 1908, John Sipe died at the age of 89 years, 11 months and 23 days. He was born in Germany January 18, 1818. He was an able and energetic citizen up to some 20 years ago, being a mechanic and master workman. He had spent his last years at his daughter's, Mrs. Nies, at Thurston, where he died. The funeral and burial were conducted by Undertaker Walker, of Springfield, on Monday, January 13, at 11 a. m., and the services at the church by Rev. Mr. Ellis of the M. E. church at Springfield. There was a large attendance although quite a bad day, and a large delegation followed the remains to the Mt. Vernon cemetery, over 20 carriages or more.
