The recent flood piled so many logs in the Santiam canal that the mill could not get a supply of fuel wood for the regular consumption of 30 cords daily. This was the cause of the shutdown.

Because the Corvallis & Eastern railroad has refused to pay its taxes on property in Lane county, and it has become delinquent, the sheriff today ordered the real property of the corporation advertised for sale for taxes due along with other delinquent property in Lane county. The property of the road can be bought by any person who will pay Sheriff Smith the amount of the road's tax, which is \$3392.34.—Albany Herald.
