Attractions at Los Angeles
Those who have not visited the seacoast of Los Angeles county for half a dozen years will scarcely recognize it today. Within the past five years a long chain of new summer resorts has sprung up on the southern California coast, while the older resorts have been vastly improved as to facilities and accommodations. Catalina, Santa Monica, Ocean Park, Venice, Plaza del Rey, Manhattan, Hermosa, Redondo, Terminal Island, Brighton Beach, Naples and Huntington Beach are all within an hour or so's ride from Los Angeles, and some of them can be reached within 35 minutes.

The fishing off the coast of Los Angeles county brings many, not only from the Northwest and Eastern states, but even from Europe. This is literally the paradise of the amateur angler, and there is no month in the year when the sport may not be followed with success.

While the conquest of the leaping tuna, the king of game fish, and the gigantic black sea bass or jewfish, has given this section its greatest piscatorial fame, there is plenty of sport for the angler of limited time and modest means, both in the waters of Catalina Island and along the coast. The man who catches three or four five-pound yellowtail—the gamiest fish of its kind that swims—in a single morning's fishing, will have no cause to complain of a lack of sport, while the white sea bass, barracuda, albicore, bonita, rock bass, sheepshead, etc., make plenty of variety. Then there is the shore fishing in San Pedro Bay, Long Beach and at many different coast resorts which yield bass, surf-fish, yellow fin, croakers, halibut, mackerel, pompano and many other varieties of game and edible fish.

One great advantage is that any of the coast fishing resorts may be reached by trolley in less than one hour's ride, while the return trip may be made at any hour of the day.

Camping Above the Clouds.
If you want to thoroughly appreciate the charm of the mountains near Los Angeles you must get into the heart of them on foot or on donkey back. The summer tourist who visits the mountain resorts adjacent to Los Angeles on a trolley trip that occupies less than a day gets more for the same amount of money than he can obtain anywhere else in the country, but he does not secure the full benefit of mountain life. It is only by a season of "camping near the sky" that these can be had. Our home people will understand this. Following are among the principal trips of interest to tourists that may be made from Los Angeles within the limit of two days. The trips to Catalina Island, San Buenaventura,

Santa Barbara, San Juan and San Diego may be made within a day, but that would leave little or no time for inspection. Unless otherwise stated these places are all reached by steam railroad.

Half Day Trips.
Santa Monica, Port Los Angeles, Terminal Island, Long Beach, San Pedro, Redondo and Soldiers Home, either by steam or electric road.
Ocean Park, Venice, Plaza del Rey, Manhattan, Hermosa, Naples, Bay City and Huntington Beach, by electric railway.

Baldwin's Ranch, San Gabriel, Mission, Sierra Madre, Manrovia or Alhambra, by either steam or electric road or trolley.
Pasadena, Ostrich Farm, Glendale, Tropico or Whittier by either steam or electric road.

Hollywood, electric railway.
San Fernando Mission, Santa Fe Springs, Steam railroad.

Observation cars on the electric lines and "sight-seeing" automobiles make two trips daily about the city.
