EXHIBIT OF SIUSLAW APPLES IN EUGENE

GEORGE MILLER WILL ARRANGE DISPLAY OF FRUIT PRODUCTS OF WESTERN LAKE COUNTY—WILL ADVERTISE FRUIT TO THE OUTSIDE WORLD

The whole Siuslaw valley is producing fine specimens of winter apples, but not yet in large enough quantities, and their good quality is not yet sufficiently known in commerce to attract competition among buyers. It has been suggested that growers of the valley make an exhibit of their fruit in Eugene in order to advertise its many good points as a commercial fruit. Such apples as are being made into cider on the river retail at \$1.50 to \$2.00 per box in Eugene, Portland and other higher in larger cities. Now that road improvement is in popular favor we are certain to have a means of getting fruit to market within a reasonable short time. In order to encourage the exhibit George Melvin Miller has offered to take charge of the exhibit at Eugene, and pay all expenses incident to the transportation of the fruit.

The display will be free to all, beginning as the apples arrive and continuing as long as the fruit keeps fit for exhibit.

Mr. Miller wants about five apples of each variety, and they must be carefully packed to avoid damage. Each apple should be rolled in soft paper, packed in excelsior, moss or soft hay, with the grower's name and address on the box. Each plate of fruit will have a card bearing the grower's name and address.

It is hoped that this may be the beginning of a series of regular annual displays that will result in stimulating increasing interest in the apple industry on the Siuslaw in producing more and even better fruit, proper packing, and best of all, secure buyers for what may be raised. The apple industry of the Siuslaw has reached its most discouraging stage, to-wit: too much for home consumption and not enough of one kind to attract competition among buyers. It is believed that before another season rolls around provision will be made for making fruit boxes on the river and that a road will be made or a steamer provided for taking them to market.—Florence West.

METHODIST REVIVAL COMES TO A CLOSE

Last night in a sweep of glory, with nineteen persons, mostly men, at the chance seeking Christ, the three weeks' revival campaign at the Methodist church closed. It has been scarcely a night that the audiences have not packed the church, the largest auditorium in the city with the exception of Villard hall, 1000 and even 1200 people having crowded into the building and on several occasions scores have been turned away for lack of room.

The benefits to the church itself and to the Christian people who have been privileged to hear Haudenschild both day and night have been immeasurable. The evangelist's teachings are of a deep, basal, Biblical character. Not only the people of the Methodist church, but friends from other churches of the city have been greatly delighted and profited by his exploitation of Biblical truth. The Methodist church itself has received an uplift which puts it in better condition to do the work of the kingdom than ever before.

The music has been a special feature of the meeting—a chorus of half a hundred voices, assisted by an orchestra, under the direction of the evangelist, have inspired the congregation to some of the most effective work ever heard in a congregational line in Eugene.

The thanks of the church and the community are due to the persons who assisted in the choir left from night to night.

As a result of the campaign there have been fully 150 conversions. The card system of church preference as directed by the official board of the church has been used. Every seeker has been directed to Christ

As a personal seeker first, then he has been asked to state his church preference, the matter of his choice in this regard being left to himself. As a result there will be scarcely a church in the city which will not receive accessions because of this meeting, as cards so signed have been sent to the respective pastors.

There have been during the revival 37 accessions to the Methodist church—a remarkable feature of this being that the larger proportion of these have been men, many of them past middle life. The total number of accessions as a result of the meeting in the Methodist church alone will be upward of 100. This church has experienced a remarkable growth during the last sixteen months, there having been 430 accessions to their number during that time. Her growth outside the revival season has been even greater than at these special times. Scarcely a Sunday passes without members standing before the altar and being received into communion. Last year 205 persons were received outside of revival effort and in this year in the 2 1/2 months previous to the special meetings 50 have united.

Evangelist Haudenschild leaves for Pendleton at 7:10 p. m. tonight, where he takes the lead in a union meeting combining the Methodists, Methodist South, Congregational, Presbyterian and Baptist churches. He is eminently fitted for leadership in such a campaign, his teachings being on the broad lines that all evangelical Christians accept.

In his closing remarks last night he publicly thanked the press of Eugene for their kindly cooperation, which has been no small factor in the culmination of this effort.

At the close of the Sunday morning service the free will offering was taken for the evangelist and \$550 was quickly given in appreciation of his services. In addition to this \$200 had been raised at an earlier date to pay the expenses of the meeting.
