The competition promises to be keen in each of the four districts and chaperone contest, and good work must be done if you want to win, as each contestant is doing her best to secure every available subscription.

Miss Hattie Cook, the popular assistant postmistress of Junction City, whose picture is published today, entered the contest from the very start and has up to the present time done remarkably well. Miss Cook is the youngest daughter of the deceased pioneer, Isaac Cook, and is an Oregonian by birth. For the past four years she has been self-sufficient and is the partial support of her mother. While her time is usually taken up with her duties, Miss Cook is nevertheless a consistent worker and devotes her spare moments to sustaining contest subscriptions. She is very anxious to win out, so her friends who are supporting her will not be disappointed. Miss Cook can be reached by mail at Junction City, and a notification from any one who wishes to aid her for the end she is striving for will appreciate her interest and help by friends when they pay subscriptions.
The result of last week's work revolutionized the contest doing so

far, that candidates who were zapparently "down and out" of the race took new life and worked from early until late and are now either up with the leaders or holding back their opponents to be cast later.
Among the most noticeable candidates who made good progress during the past week, as the change in the line-up of votes will show, are Mrs. W. W. Branstetter, Mrs. C. O. Hudson, Mrs. H. L. Gibbs and Mrs. Jno. Spores, all competing for chaperone honors, these candidates having cast over 10,000 votes. This is a remarkable showing owing to the fact that the field has been so well cleared over by candidates in the regular contest, but it just goes to show that people are always glad to assist others who show an inclination to help themselves.
In district number one Miss Idah Henderson cast 54,806 votes during the past week, and Miss Margaret Woods polled nearly 40,000, which placed both names first over the 50,000 mark. Both of the above named candidates are equally determined to hold first honors and both are very active workers, having a host of admiring supporters who will render what assistance they can when the occasion demands.
Miss Alta Williams made the best showing in district number two during the special offer week according to the published list. She added over 20,000 votes to the total of a week previous, and now leads her competitors by several thousand for the Los Angeles trip. Considering the territory Alta Williams is cover-

ing she has done very well and it will not be surprising if she is announced as a winner of one of the prizes to be awarded to this district if she continues to secure subscriptions for the balance of the contest as she has done in the past.
Miss Ula Cushman, of Acme, polled more than 12,000 votes during the past six days. Owing to the fact that the delivery service is nearly two days late to the coast towns the candidates are naturally working to a disadvantage, as most orders received by the candidates are for the weekly. However, there is no telling what may transpire between now and the night of February 8.
Miss Effie Withrow, of Springfield, district number four, who previously to the week of special offer occupied eighth place on the score list, now leads by several thousand, having added over 25,000 to her score.
Miss Withrow has numerous friends who reside in and around Springfield with whom she is extremely popular. She is the manager of the Sunset telephone station, located in Springfield and owing to her accommodating ways has made good friends with all with whom she has had business dealings. During the past week over 400,000 votes were cast, or nearly as much as were cast the entire first four weeks of the contest. Aside from that number many thousands are held in reserve by different candidates and chaperone candidates who prefer to occupy third or fourth place on the list rather than take the lead at the present. One thing is certain—no one has enough polled or held in reserve to warrant them winning the prize, and victory still remains for the most energetic workers.
Many More Subscriptions Needed to Win

Now that the special offer of votes is over, candidates should not let up for a single moment, but go after subscriptions more determined than ever, for as the close of the contest is very soon you will find that subscriptions are more scarce than at the start.
But if such is the case don't let it discourage it for a moment. Go to your friends who subscribed in the early part of the contest for three or six months, and get them to renew their subscription for another year of two.

It will be yours for the asking, and for these renewals you will receive coupons according to the votes allowed as per schedule. Mention the fact when turning in subscriptions if you are, renewals, so you will receive the proper amount of votes.
Many of the candidates are doing their best to create a good reserve, which is a good scheme, but it is a good idea to poll enough votes from day to day to keep your name at the top of the list in your district or second place, as people who give subscriptions like to feel as if they were giving their support to a contestant whose chances of winning are as good as the next one.

Your opponents may have more votes than you think and if you think you have enough to win it wouldn't be wise to stop work, for probably a

few thousand votes is what you need to win.
Go on the idea that you haven't half enough, then get right down to an earnest campaign and secure the other half.
Scores of subscriptions are being turned into the office every day by the various contestants and their friends, and as the time is getting shorter, an anxiousness prevails which only inspires each one to exert every effort to exert all the votes and coupons that can be gotten.
If you do not take advantage of every opportunity to win one of the valuable prizes, it is an opportunity lost which may not be given again, so if you only need a few thousand votes to win, get them within the next few days.

Now that the end of the contest is only a few days distant, most of the aspirants for The Guard trips are conserving their strength for the final spurt. All signs point to the warmest kind of a finish. Some of the thrifty ones have been saving up votes for some time past, in order to surprise their competitors when the final show-down comes. Some have been striving to get in just enough day by day to hold a certain position in the score list; others have salted down every vote they could get, allowing themselves to fall way behind so as to delude their rivals with the notion that they were not to be feared as competitors. A number of those who have been making a little visible progress of late are likely to be in at the finish with enough votes to overwhelm some of those who have kept constantly in the limelight and imagined they had a clinch.
While others are resting on their laurels of last week's work, it would be a wise idea to see your friends and secure every possible order during this week, as all will be needed before the ballot box closes for the last time on the night of February 8 at 10 o'clock.
