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NO ALUM—NO LIME PHOSPHATES.

BANKERS REJECT CURRENCY MEASURES
Chicago, Jan. 20.—The resolution committee of the currency bankers' association of the American Bankers' Association tonight issued a full report of yesterday's meeting of the association, at which the various currency plans now before congress were discussed and rejected. The report summarizes the commission's objections to the Aldrich bill and then presents a bill in 12 sections which the commission, with the backing of the association, will recommend to congress.

The Aldrich bill is declared to be "impracticable, unworkable and financially unsound." The Fowler bill, according to the report, "introduces schemes so far-reaching in their scope and touching so many collateral interests that we believe its passage would unsettle rather than improve financial conditions."

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
