

HENDRICKS PLEADS GUILTY IN FEDERAL COURT TODAY

Jan. 22.—Former United States Commissioner H. H. Hendricks pleaded guilty in the federal court today to his share in the alleged illegal sale of land by the Butterfield Land & Lumber Company. This is believed to be the first time in the history of the company and the Hall-Mays company that a person connected with the company has pleaded guilty to the operations of the company.

Washington, Jan. 20.—The application of George W. Austin, of New York, for a restraining order against Secretary of the Treasury Cortelyou to prevent the latter from allowing \$21,500,000 worth of Panama canal bonds to certain National banks was denied by Justice Gould, of the supreme court of the District of Columbia.

VON BULOW WILL NOT ANSWER SOCIALIST QUERIES

Berlin, Jan. 23.—Chancellor von Bulow refused categorically in the Reichstag today to reply to the socialist interpellation on the subject of Prussian suffrage. This action precipitated a deafening uproar from the members during which all the ministers left the house and the debate continued before half empty benches.

The buildings of the parliament are guarded today by a strong police force armed with sabres and pistols. Furthermore, the thoroughfares of Berlin are constantly patrolled by mounted and foot police.

SHAW SELLS INTEREST IN TRUST COMPANY

New York, Jan. 22.—Ex-Secretary Shaw today stated that he had not resigned the presidency of the Car-

negle Trust Company, but had contracted to sell his holdings in the company, and if paid according to the terms would resign March 1.

ABE RUEF UNABLE TO SECURE COUNSEL

San Francisco, Jan. 22.—Abraham Ruef's failure to secure counsel in the two days allowed him by Superior Judge Lawlor on Monday was the cause today of another delay in fixing the date of his trial, the court granting him until two o'clock Friday afternoon Ruef was unable to secure suitable counsel, and expects to engage a Los Angeles attorney to defend him.

EVANS' FLEET SAILS FROM RIO JANEIRO

Washington, Jan. 22.—Admiral Evans has cabled the navy department from Rio Janeiro that his fleet, with the exception of the Arethusa, sailed today for Punta Arenas.

ANTHONY COMSTOCK SAYS THAW WANTED WHITE PROSECUTED

New York, Jan. 22.—Anthony Comstock, vice president of the Society

for the Suppression of Vice, was the principal witness in the trial of Harry Thaw today. He testified that late in 1904 Thaw complained to him of vicious practices of Stanford White and several of White's friends. During the year that followed Thaw wrote him several times, and was a frequent visitor to Comstock's headquarters. These letters were read in evidence. They gave the names of the alleged victims of White in his notorious studio and referred to White as "the blackguard." The letters are now evidence in the case, but were not mentioned in the trial when Dr. Evans was telling what Thaw had said to him of his efforts to have White sent to the penitentiary.

"I didn't want to have him kill the beast," said Thaw, "but I did want to have him brought to court and his acts shown. Providence intervened, however. It was an act of Providence."

COURT MARTIAL OF GERMAN OFFICERS OPENS

BANK OFFICIALS DENIED MOTION AT PORTLAND

ROSS AND CO-DEFENDANTS FAIL TO GET INDICTMENT QUASHED BY JUDGE CLELAND—DECISION IN SAN FRANCISCO CASES IS POSTPONED

Portland, Jan. 22.—Presiding Judge Cleland in the circuit court today denied the motions of J. Thoburn Ross, T. T. Burkhardt, George H. Hill and John E. Aitchison, officials of the Title Guarantee & Trust Company, to quash the indictments against them. They will now assail the informations by filing demurrers, alleging the matters against them do not constitute a crime.

SAN FRANCISCO CASES POSTPONED

San Francisco, Jan. 22.—Judge Dunne continued for one week his decision upon the demurrers to the indictments against them filed by Walter J. Barnett and J. Dalzell Brown, formerly vice president and general manager respectively of the California Safe Deposit & Trust Company, now in the hands of a receiver. A similar postponement was made in the demurrer of James Treadwell, a former director.

JAPANESE SPY AT FORT STEVENS

Fort Stevens, Or., Jan. 21.—Consternation was caused today by the capture of two Japanese who were found loitering around the west battery of Fort Stevens. The sentry, while walking his post to the west battery, suddenly came upon two Japanese who were walking upon the parapet of the battery. As this place is unfrequented, except by special permission of the district artillery commander, the sentry hid behind a sentry box and watched their actions. Seeing them point to

the different guns and looking over the situation in general, the sentry took the men into custody and marched them back to the main post. They were then interviewed by the district adjutant-leutenant, B. H. Kerfoot, who could obtain no satisfactory explanation for their trespassing.

Although nothing of an incriminating nature was found upon their persons, indications are that they were at the post for the purpose of obtaining plans and sketches of the different fortifications and modes of defense.

Pittsburg, Jan. 22.—The Traders & Mechanics' Bank, a state institution, was closed today by order of the bank examiners.

The Treasury Trust Company, a subsidiary institution, occupying the same building, was closed, but voluntarily, it is said.

WOMAN KILLED BRADY AND SHOT HERSELF

New York, Jan. 22.—A woman believed to be May R. Clark shot and killed Frank Brady, an advertising agent, in the crowded restaurant of a department store and then turned the weapon on herself, firing three shots into her body, inflicting serious wounds. She was taken to the hospital. Brady was shot five times. The woman died in the hospital. She used two revolvers, and a third, fully loaded, was found in her muff.

TWO FEDERAL DISTRICTS IN OREGON

LIVESTOCK MEN FAVOR LEASING OF PUBLIC DOMAIN

Denver, Jan. 22.—Resolutions favoring government control and leasing of public grazing lands were adopted by the executive committee of the American Livestock Association today and reported to the convention. The resolutions favor the passage of the Burkett bill with some amendments, and were stoutly contested by the Colorado Horse and Cattle Growers' Association, which is opposed to the leasing system, as proposed by the federal administration.

NEGROES ATTEMPT TO BLOW UP FACTORY

Nashville, Jan. 22.—An attempt was made today to dynamite and burn the Hayes-Sory Rugs tobacco factory at Clarksville, Tenn., and the guards killed two negroes and wounded another. An investigation showed the door of the factory saturated with coal oil and four sticks of dynamite placed against it. Sufficient dynamite was found on the bodies of the negroes to wreck the building. The third negro escaped.

OREGON POSTMASTERS ARE AGREED UPON

Washington, D. C., Jan. 21.—Senators Fulton and Bourne and Representative Ellis today united in recommending the reappointment of the following postmasters in the second district, whose offices became presidential January 1: William E. Tate, Wasco; Melior E. Page, Clatskanie; John Boswell, Vale, and John Dorn, Echo. The postoffice department has called for the resignation of Postmaster H. S. Buck, of Sumpter, because of the report of inspectors, but it was subsequently found the report was not substantiated, so the demand for his resignation has been recalled and Buck continues in office.
