## U. OF. O NEEDS MORE MONEY FOR CURRENT EXPENSES

At the annual meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Oregon, in this city this morning, reports of the president of the Board of Regents were received, says the Portland Telegram. The report of the president of the Board of Regents showed a deficit of \$15,000.

The report of the president of the university showed that there is a total enrollment, both of collegiate and graduate, up to the present time of 299. The report also shows that members of the faculty served during the months of October, November and December without salary. The meeting was held in the office of C. A. Dolph, in the Mohawk building. The members who were present were: R. S. Bean, president of the board; S. H. Friendly, F. V. Holman, C. A. Dolph and J. C. Alsworth. P. L. Campbell, president of the university, was also present. feature of the meeting was the conferring of the degree of bachelor of science upon Sabro Ozawa, a Japanese. He began his work at the University while employed as a section hand on the Southern Pacific. Recently he has been employed as a civil engineer by that road. Several other Japanese have received degrees from the University.

In the report of the president of the board of regents it is shown that there is a balance on hand of \$2,768.35.

"From this balance," the report says, "should be deducted \$2754.93 for bills and accounts in process of settlement, leaving a net balance of \$513.42. There is also outstanding \$19,821.67 in salary certificates for the last quarter of 1907, issued by royal order, because of the invoking of the referendum on the act of 1907 increasing the appropriation for the support and maintenance of the University, and the construction of additional buildings, purchase of books for the library, and apparatus, etc. These certificates and the resolution of the board, under which they were issued, impose no contract liability on either the University or the state, but the understanding is that they are to be paid with interest out of the pending appropriation. If it shall hereafter become available, and if not, they are to be reported to the next legislature, with a recommendation that they be paid."
