MINERWORKERS IN FAVOR OF EQUAL SUFFRAGE

Indianapolis, Jan. 23.—The United Mineworkers adjourned until tomorrow, as none of the committees were ready to report. The delegates were addressed by Miss Laura Gregg, of Kansas, a delegate from the National Woman Suffrage Association, and the delegates endorsed the movement by a rising vote. Yesterday President Mitchell made perhaps the most eloquent speech of his life when he was forced to accept a gift of \$2700 tendered him by the miners of Montana and Wyoming as a token of their appreciation of his efforts to make their conditions better.

PORTLAND PEOPLE LOYAL TO VARSITY

At a banquet of the Portland association of the Oregon Alumni Association, held in that city Tuesday night, a vigorous campaign in favor of ample support for the University was inaugurated. Tom Richardson, secretary of the Portland Commercial Club, made an earnest plea for the support of the University. He said that the referendum on the appropriation was unfortunate and must be combatted. "The appropriation is less than 1 per cent of the amount of money left in the state last year by the dairy industry, less than 3 per cent of the fruit crop and 1 per cent of the wheat yield of Oregon," said Mr. Richardson. "The first question asked by people who expect to come to this state is about the schools. The University is worth several times its cost as an advertisement."

State Senator Beach, Assistant Secretary Mossosohn, of the Chamber of Commerce, Zera Snow, Dr. F. C. Leonard, Charles F. Clark, C. E. Woody, Colonel R. A. Miller, F. E. Beach, Dr. J. D. Fenton, County School Superintendent Robinson and W. G. Obersteuffer made suggestions as to the line of activity to be pursued on behalf of the appropriation, and the circulation of a subscription paper raised \$224 to be expended in payment of the cost of printing arguments in the pamphlet to be issued by the secretary of state. Theodore B. Wilcox headed the list with \$50. President Campbell said that careful computation estimated the cost to the taxpayers of the state at 25 cents on each \$1000 of assessed valuation.

Denver, Jan. 23.—H. A. Jastro, of Bakersfield, Cal., was unanimously elected president of the American National Livestock Association today, succeeding Mar do MacKenzie, of Trinidad, Colo., who has served two terms and declined re-election.

A resolution was adopted today asking congress to establish a minimum rate of 20 miles an hour for stock trains, except where physical conditions prevented. Los Angeles was selected as the meeting place of the next convention.

ROADS PREPARE FOR REDUCTION OF SALARY LIST

New York, Jan. 23.—Figures prepared by one of the large railroad companies, says the Tribune, show that a week ago there were 320,000 idle freight cars in the United States and about 8000 locomotives laid up on account of the falling off of traffic. Figuring the cars at \$1000 each and the locomotives at \$15,000, the railroads have \$440,000,000 tied up in rolling stock, for which they have no present use. It is estimated that thirty thousand men are idle by reason of the idle freight cars, etc., and it is understood that the railroads are considering the reducing of salaries.

Philadelphia, Jan. 23.—Because of the falling off of travel, due to the business depression, the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company has withdrawn one hundred street cars and will take off 25 to 40 more.
