HARTOG RETURNS FROM AD MEN'S CONVENTION

ALMOST LOST HIS VOICE AT OAKLAND YELLING FOR EUGENE AND OREGON

OREGON'S WINTER CLIMATE BEATS CALIFORNIA'S, HE SAYS—WILL FEED VISITING DELEGATES ON ROYAL ANNE CHERRIES AT CONVENTION IN PORTLAND

John H. Hartog, manager of the Eugene Commercial Club, arrived home this morning from Oakland, Cal., where he attended the convention of the Pacific Coast Ad Men, and incidentally did some tall boasting for Oregon and Eugene.

Interviewed at the club this morning, Mr. Hartog said he was very glad to get back to Eugene once more to enjoy the glorious Oregon winter weather. The first day he was at Oakland the rain came down in torrents all day—not like our gentle Oregon rains, but it simply poured. The next day the weather was so hot that it was very uncomfortable, and that night after the meeting it was so cold that he almost froze to death waiting for the car to take him down town.

Mr. Hartog and the other members of the Oregon delegation at the convention put in some splendid work for this state, and before the end of the meeting the crowds in speaking of Oregon always mentioned Portland and Eugene as being the two principal cities of the state.

Mr. Hartog says that since he left California copious rains have fallen in the Sacramento valley, and in passing through it presented a much better appearance than it did when he left there. But after having been in the Willamette valley for a few weeks he could not help but notice the radical difference between the two valleys. Here the farm houses as a rule are two-story structures, and there is a general air of prosperity around the farm, but there the houses are nearly all one-story high and scattered here and there over the valley much further apart than here.

The Oregon delegation left Oakland yesterday, but Mr. Hartog, having almost lost his voice yelling for Oregon and Eugene, left a day ahead of time before his voice was entirely gone. The California ad men made him promise that when they come to Portland for their convention in June to bring along a lot of those Royal Anne cherries which he described so fluently in his speech, and which he boasted all during the convention.

PERRY BELMONT ATTACKS PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT

Washington, Jan. 23.—Perry Belmont, president of the National Campaign Publicity League, tonight charges President Roosevelt with utilizing the machinery of the government in the Taft campaign.

"Under the cover of a proclamation, prohibiting federal office-holders from activity in securing delegates for a third term," said Belmont, the country has been flooded with federal emissaries and officials instructed to influence the election of delegates pledged to support the President's candidate, who may eventually be the President himself.

"The power of the executive has been and is being used for the same purpose even in the judicial branch. Civil service reform has gone mad in the hunt for delegates. The war, navy, postoffice and interior departments are being demoralized by the corrupting influence of such direct interference of the chief executive in political management."

JUDGE CAKE COMES OUT AGAINST FULTON

H. M. Cake's expected candidacy for the United States senatorship, to succeed C. W. Fulton, was announced yesterday by Mr. Cake, says the Oregonian. There are now two avowed aspirants for the Republican nomination for that office, the other being Mr. Fulton. Mr. Cake says he will support the direct primary law and statement No. 1. Mr. Fulton is an advocate of statement No. 2, and while not aggressively fighting it, is contented by its advocacy as an enemy.

Mr. Cake will announce his platform later, but it is known by his friends that its chief planks will be demands for improvement of rivers and harbors and revision of the tariff. He has already declared himself opposed to Senator Fulton's plan for enlarged federal powers. Mr. Cake will make a stump campaign over the state, beginning next month, for the primary nomination, and if nominated will continue the campaign up to the general election, June 1.

At Moro, Oregon, yesterday, fire starting in the two-story Elrod block destroyed property valued at \$47,000. The losses: W. F. Schuller, general merchandise, \$28,000; insurance, \$18,000; M. E. Miller, attorney, \$1,600; insurance, \$800; Elrod & Cochran, real estate dealers, net loss estimated at \$250. The building was valued at \$16,000, with \$7,000 insurance.

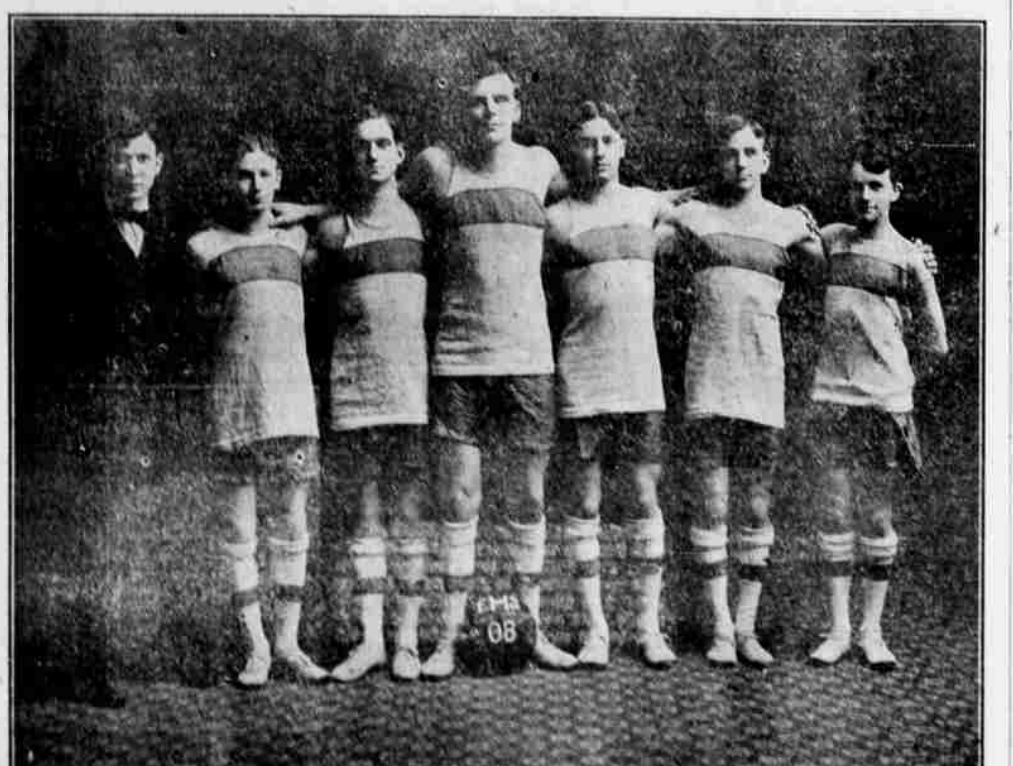
