**GROVE EDITOR CALLS EUGENE QUEEN CITY**

**LEADER SCRIBE NOTES WONDERFUL IMPROVEMENTS DURING PAST YEAR—TAKES RIDE ON STREET CAR AND NOTES THE GROWTH AND PROSPERITY OF THE CITY**

A representative of the Leader visited Eugene this week, the first time in more than a year, and was surprised to note the great improvement and advancement being made in the "Queen City" of the upper Willamette. Two of the finest improvements and greatest evidences of enterprise on the part of the citizens of the county seat town are the pavement on Willamette street and the new electric street car lines. It was stated that many who first opposed the pavement of Eugene's main street are now active advocates of like improvements, after noting the many advantages derived from such permanent improvements and the jump that they invariably make in property values.

The new street car line seemed to be doing a good business, and the writer enjoyed a ride with Conductor L. R. Baker, formerly of Cottage Grove, out to the end of the line in the vicinity of Hendricks Park, a distance of nearly two and a half miles from the depot. This ride takes one through a beautiful residence district, modern homes and nicely kept lawns being in evidence on every hand. The site of the new Divinity School, the foundation and stone walls of which are well under way, is also passed on this line. At the southeast corner of the State University campus the electric line forks, one branch continuing east through Fairmount, the other extending south by the Masonic cemetery and out to Hendricks Park. From the cemetery hill a grand view of Eugene is afforded, as well as of the new hospital, which is now being furnished and will be ready for patients within a few days. A good road is being built from the foot of the hill to the building, so that there will be no trouble in reaching the hospital with teams.

Excavation for the Hulla two-story brick building on East Ninth street was begun this week, and at the same time the work of delivering material for the construction of Mrs. Patterson's one-story brick across the street was begun. New cottages and palatial homes are springing up in

various parts of the city and nearly every lot along the new car line beyond the Odd Fellows' cemetery has been purchased.—Cottage Grove Leader.
