COUNCIL PASSES LIQUOR SHIPMENT RESOLUTIONS

FAVORS LAW PROHIBITING SHIPMENT OF INTOXICANTS TO PROHIBITION TERRITORY - ASKS FOR ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION FOR POSTOFFICE BUILDING

At the meeting of the city council yesterday afternoon in addition to the passing of ordinances assessing the cost of paving Willamette street between Eleventh and Thirteenth and of certain sewers, as mentioned in yesterday's Guard, it passed the following resolution:

"Resolved: That it is the judgment of the common council of the city of Eugene that the bill now before congress, commonly known as the Tillman bill, which permits the prohibition of the shipment of intoxicating liquors into prohibition territory, is demanded by good public policy and should be enacted into law; and be it further

Resolved: That our senators and representatives be and they hereby respectfully asked to use their best endeavors to secure the passage of this act as speedily as may be.

"That this resolution be properly authenticated by the mayor and city recorder and a copy hereof forwarded to each of our senators and representatives."

Special Appropriation.
The resolution on the postoffice appropriation was as follows:
Resolved by the Common Council of the city of Eugene:

"Whereas, The city of Eugene has at the petition of property owners having property thereon, improved by paving and curbing its main street and has assessed the cost thereof exclusive of street intersections to the property abutting thereon; and

Whereas, The United States owns a quarter block of land fronting said improved street and the just proportion of the cost of such improvement chargeable to said quarter is \$..... and

Whereas, The city has been informed through the postoffice officials that there are no funds of the United States available to pay this assessment.

Therefore, the Hon. W. C. Hawley, congressman from this district, and Senators Fulton and Bourne are hereby respectfully asked to use their best endeavors to cause an appropriation to be made to meet this assessment.

Postoffice Appropriation.
The mayor and city attorney were instructed to draft appropriate resolutions asking congress to increase the appropriation for the government building in Eugene from \$50,000 to \$100,000.

ROSEBURG HIGH BEATS EUGENE HIGH AT BASKETBALL

In a very fast game the Roseburg High school basketball team won from the local High by the score of 27 to 14. By the victory the Roseburg team takes the lead in the Intercollegiate League, Eugene now being second. This is the first High school game the High here has lost.

The first half was 15 to 4, the second half 14 to 10. The latter was fiercely fought during every minute, the local team doing some very pretty work. Walter Fisher, at forward, was Roseburg's star, while Cockerline, at guard and forward, played a very fast game for Eugene's aggregation. The visitors were much larger on the average and won the game on long shots, some most difficult baskets being thrown. French was very sure on fouls.

The second half opened with fiercer playing, and it was sometime before the midget Fisher tossed the first of the half. At intervals, altogether too regular, he scored three other long shots. Wannacott also made one. Cockerline made one at guard, and Gwyn Watson shot in a clean toss. During the middle of the game Cockerline went to forward, where he made one basket, and Young, who replaced him at guard, also scored two points. The game until the last was terrific, and had it lasted another ten minutes the locals would have scored more.

The local team was very fast, but lacked by a small margin the speed necessary to cope with Roseburg's strength and size. The visitors, accompanied by the girls' team of the high school, left today to play at Albany tonight.
