NEW SHINGLE MILL ALMOST READY FOR OPERATION—MR. SHAW STARTS NEW CONFECTIONERY STORE—OTHER INTERESTING ITEMS CULLED FROM THE NEWS

The new shingle mill that the News made mention of some time ago as being one of the prospective manufacturing industries for this city in the near future, is now under construction and is nearly completed. The president of the company, W. E. Warner, informs us that the machinery has nearly all arrived, and will be placed ready for operation within a week or ten days. The mill will have a capacity of 40,000 every ten hours, and when in operation will probably run to its full capacity. The main building is 2x26 feet, and a large dry shed will be built on the west side.

Architect John Hunzicker was over from Eugene and of course attended the meeting. After thoroughly going over the building the committee were satisfied that a whole the job was satisfactory, with the exception of a few minor details, which were not exactly as the specifications called for, though they can be easily remedied, when the weather settles so as to permit. After considering the weak points the committee and contractors came to an agreement and the building was accepted and is now the property of the Odd Fellows.

He has leased the Kepner building, east of the one he now occupies, and will fit it up for an ice cream parlor and confectionery store. 
