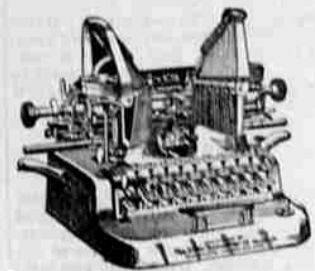

NEARLY ALL OLD OFFICERS SEEK RENOMINATION

SHERIFF FISK ONLY COUNTY OFFICER WHO WILL NOT RUN THIS YEAR.

LEE, KEENEY, CHRISMAN, PRICE, EASTLAND AND DILLARD ANOUNCE CANDIDACY—BOWN AND HAMMOND MENTIONED FOR SHERIFF ON DEMOCRATIC TICKET.

To use an old-time stereotyped expression, the Lane county political pot is simmering and the boiling point will soon be reached. At the regular election next June all the county officers will be chosen with the exception of one commissioner, H. D. Edwards, who was elected two years ago, holding over.

It is learned by The Guard that every holder of the important offices, with the exception of Sheriff Fisk, will try for re-election this year and several have already filed their nominating petitions. They are: County Clerk E. U. Lee, County Judge G. R. Chrisman, County Commissioner Hugh M. Price and County Assessor B. F. Keeney. County Treasurer R. E. Eastland today informed a reporter that he intends trying for re-election and it is understood that County Superintendent W. B. Dillard will do likewise. Coroner Gordon and Surveyor Collier are non-committal on the subject, but they will also probably fall in line. These are all Republicans. There have been no other candidates mentioned for these several offices except that of county commissioner, George Comer, of Cottage Grove, having expressed a desire to serve the people in that capacity. There will probably be a hard fight between him and Mr. Price for the nomination at the primaries.

The people of Cottage Grove and the southern part of the county have for a number of years striven to get the commissionership and nearly succeeded two years ago when W. T. Kayser, of Cottage Grove, ran against H. D. Edwards at the primaries and lost by only a few votes. As far as learned the Democrats have mentioned no one for these offices.

Race for Sheriff's Office.
As announced by The Guard some time ago, Sheriff Fisk has determined to stay out of politics hereafter and will not run again this year. His chief deputy, C. C. Hammond, has announced his intention of seeking the nomination on the Democratic ticket, and Harry Bown, a former deputy of Fisk, is also prominently mentioned for the nomination. These two will come to an agreement soon, it is said, and, one of the other will withdraw from the field. As yet no Republican candidate for the office has appeared above the horizon.

There has not been much said as to legislative candidates in either party.

RESOLUTIONS ON INCREASED APPROPRIATION

Following are the city council's resolutions on the proposed increase in the appropriation for the government building:

Eugene, Or., Jan. 24, 1908.
To the Hon. C. W. Fulton, Hon. W. C. Athan Bourne, Jr., Hon. W. C. Hawley and Hon. W. R. Ellis, members of the senate and house respectfully:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to transmit to you the following resolution passed by the common council of the city of Eugene, at a meeting thereof held January 24, 1908:

"Whereas, There was heretofore appropriated by congress the sum of \$59,000 for the erection of a federal building at Eugene, the site of which has already been secured, and the erection of which will probably begin before another session of congress; and

"Whereas, There is a feeling general among our people that the appropriation should be increased to \$100,000 that a larger building and one more appropriate to the needs of the community may be had; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, by the common council of the city of Eugene, That we heartily second this desire of our people and earnestly request such increase in the appropriation. In justification of our course we call attention to the following among other considerations:

1. Since the appropriation was made the city of Eugene has progressed in population, in amount of business done, in providing better streets, public parks, street railway facilities, and in settling the preliminary work for an enlarged and adequate water supply, at a rate wholly unknown in its former history. It is difficult by figures to show the extent of this advance. Something of it may be seen in this: In two years our children of school age have increased from 1884 to 2144; our high school attendance from 268 to 356, giving us, as we may believe, the second largest high school in the state; our postal stamps sales from \$18,256 to \$20,719; our money on deposit in banks from \$1,429,865 to \$2,523,250. One year ago there was not a block of paved street in the city—now we have nine blocks of fully completed hard bitulitic pavement, nine blocks more under construction and ten in addition ordered. One year ago there was not a block of street railway in the city; now we have 34 blocks in successful operation equipped with the best double-tracked electric cars. We can say with no little pride, yet truthfully, that the Eugene of today is a city of distinctly higher rank than the Eugene of two years ago; but—

2. We feel that we have the assurance of even greater things. Eugene is the county seat and commercial center of a very large and rich county. Lane county exceeds in area some of the Eastern states. Its extreme western limits lie in range 12 west, while its extreme eastern extends into 9 east, Willamette meridian. In extreme width it embraces 11 governmental townships. We are assured by experts that it contains a larger body of standing timber than any other county in the United States. Near Eugene the Willamette branches, sending in various directions several large tributaries, upon which, or along the banks of which this vast market. Many miles of steam and trolley railroad must reach into these river valleys from our region. This great body of timber is as yet scarcely touched. The next 15 years cannot fail to make Eugene a very considerable city. What the lumber industry did in quickly developing the interior cities of Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota it cannot fail to do for Eugene, since here a much larger amount of timber stands on a given area, and the demand for lumber is constantly increasing, while the area of production is constantly lessening.

We pass over our agricultural resources and other local sources of wealth, important as we esteem them, since we think the lumber industry assures our city as nothing else can, immediate and unprecedented growth.

We most urgently request our senators and representatives in congress to use their best endeavors to secure the increase in appropriation, and to thank you in advance for the efforts you may take in our behalf.
