### NEGRO CAUGHT WITH MONEY IN HIS SHOES

Roseburg, Or., Jan. 27.—The ne-  
 gro who is alleged to have stolen over  
 \$150 in money from the dining car  
 conductor on the southbound over-  
 land train No. 15 early last Saturday  
 morning was captured without diffi-  
 culty late in the afternoon of that day  
 by Constable Nels Jones and lodged  
 in jail. His clothes yielded \$191.65.  
 Of that sum \$55 in currency was  
 sewed in his underwear, \$135 in gold  
 was concealed in his shoes, and the  
 balance, \$6.65 in silver, was loose in  
 his trousers pocket. The negro also  
 had a bunch of dining car keys. He  
 sullenly refuses to even give his  
 name. His examination will be held  
 probably tomorrow, when the dining  
 car conductor is expected to reach  
 here on return from his run to San  
 Francisco to give testimony. As cir-  
 cuit court is now in session, the ne-  
 gro's case can be disposed of in min-  
 imum time.
