CHARTER OF COTTAGE GROVE NEEDS REVISING

Cottage Grove, Jan. 29.—At a large and well attended meeting of the Commercial Club of this city on Monday evening a committee was appointed for the purpose of revising and bringing up to date the present city charter. The committee appointed consisted of H. O. Thompson, Fingal Hinds and Oliver Veatch.

There have several matters come up which have proven the present charter was deficient, and this committee, working in conjunction with the one to be named by the Merchants' Protective Association, it is hoped will be able to draw up a document which, when presented to the voters of this place for ratification, will meet with the approval of all.

CUTTING OF RIVER BANK ENDANGERS ROAD

Editor Guard:—Please call attention of the county court to this one subject. Last Saturday, having business up the McKenzie river, as I reached the Hendricks place I noticed the cutting away of the river bank. I took the measure at the west end of his place and there is only 20 feet left in width of the road between the corner of fence and the bank of the river. The last high water has cut away some thirty feet in width for some 100 rods up and down the river, commencing a little below Mr. Hendricks' house, and down the river. One more high water and then the road will be gone, as the river is washing the bank now. The entire length down to where the road was changed has been cut away, and now there is only the brush between the road and the river.

OLD PEOPLE'S HOME HAS TWO INMATES

MRS. SEARS AND MRS. TODD FIND OUT THEY ARE THIRD COUSINS—ONLY ONE BUILDING NOW OCCUPIED

Mrs. Sears, the old lady mentioned by The Guard yesterday as entering the Christian old folks' home in this city, having come up yesterday afternoon from Corvallis, is the second person to enter the institution since it was opened a short time ago, the first being Mrs. Todd, who is 93 years old and probably the oldest person in Lane county. She has resided in Eugene for a number of years. Mrs. Todd was very glad to see Mrs. Sears come, as she often became very lonely at the home with no one but the matron there. Soon after Mrs. Sears' arrival the two old ladies found out that they were blood relations, being third cousins, a fact that they did not know before.

The home has been open for several weeks, only the smaller building of the two owned by the church being occupied at present. The Klossch Tillamook Club of the University occupies the larger residence, and will continue to do so until the end of the present year, after which it will be turned over for the use of the home.

MEDFORD IMPROVEMENT BONDS ARE PURCHASED

The improved condition of the financial market and the splendid credit Medford securities have abroad were reflected in the bids made by various financial houses for the \$25,000 ten-year six per cent city improvement bonds.

E. H. Rollins & Sons, of Boston, secured the bonds, paying a premium of \$1200 for them. W. A. Scott represented the successful bidders. The bid was accepted by the city council Saturday night.

Other bids were received from the Jackson County Bank, on behalf of John Navien, of Chicago, \$25,050; McDonald, McCoy & Co., of Chicago, \$26,150; A. J. Hood & Co., of Detroit, Mich., \$25,025; and Morris Bros., of Portland, \$25,955.—Medford Tribune.
