**SCHEME TO LIFT LID A WEE BIT**

Salem, Ore., Jan. 27.—A big surprise was sprung today when Mayor J. P. Reddy of Medford, filed an initiative petition for a constitutional amendment, which, if adopted, will result in many "open towns" in Oregon. His measure proposes an amendment to the section of the constitution relative to municipal corporation. The purpose is to give cities exclusive authority to license, regulate or suppress race tracks, pool rooms, theaters, saloons and similar places.

The effect of this amendment, if adopted, would be to divest sheriffs and district attorneys of the power to suppress poolrooms, Sunday saloons and Sunday theatres and give municipal authorities power to run a town as wide open as they desire. The constitution now provides that city charters must be "subject to the constitution and criminal laws of the state." The amendment proposed by Mr. Reddy leaves out this important clause.

Has Over 9000 Signatures.  
Though the petition for the proposed amendment has been circulated, it has not been generally known that such a move was on foot. Mr. Reddy also filed an argument in support of his measure, the substance of which is that the conditions in one part of the state are not similar to those in another and that each city should have power to regulate its own affairs.
