MUNICIPAL WATER SYSTEM PAYS DIVIDENDS

(Corvallis Times.)

The Corvallis mountain water system earned \$10,242.61 from January 1st to December 31st, 1907, a period of 12 months. Besides paying interest and other expenses, it earned a balance and had on hand in cash January 1st, \$2949.98, or nearly \$4000. This was besides paying \$1000 toward the purchase of the Farra plant. The figures, which appear in the annual report of the water commissioner, published below, demonstrate the water system to be an immense success financially. Its income from consumers is nearly \$900 a month. The commission is extending the system as rapidly as earnings will permit, with the result that the number of consumers may be increased, and the earning capacity accordingly extended. A revenue of \$1000 a month or more will ultimately be reached. The balance of \$4000 on hand at the beginning of the current year, is already partly expended in extensions now in progress, and all will be spent on such extensions, either building or planned. Three thousand five hundred dollars remain to be paid on the Farra plant, besides the interest, and the commission figures that it can take care of the necessary extensions of the plant and complete payment of the sum within four years.
