Miss Grace Wood, of district number one, polled 18,281 votes, which places her name with the high three and in a position to win the scholarship prize for which she has since the start of the contest been striving so industriously.

Miss Zelma Cruzan, of district number two, was displaced by Miss Leta Sanford, of Cottage Grove, by several hundred votes, friends of Miss Sanford having added 6622 to her count of yesterday. It has been nip and tuck for first honors in this district continually, and it is a safe prediction that the three leaders of today will have a large say about the prizes when the awards to this district are made.

Today's mail brought vote subscriptions for both Miss Hattie Cook of Junction City, and Miss Ula Cushman, of Acme. Miss Cushman was favored with two new one-year and one six-months' subscriptions, which places her name over the 40,000 mark, while Miss Cook was the recipient of a subscription for one year, new from friends at Roseburg, aside from the votes cast by herself. Miss Cook still leads by some 10,000 votes, but this lead can be easily offset by a little effort put forth by her competitors.

The most noticeable change in district number four is that of Miss Georgia Neff, of Coburg. That she is a popular beyond a doubt as the assistant postmistress of Coburg is proven by people whom she has dealings with that are anxious to have her name announced the winner of the Los Angeles vacation trip.

More unsolicited subscriptions have been credited to Miss Neff's total than any candidate in the race.

MORE INITIATIVE PETITIONS FILED WITH SECRETARY

Six more initiative petitions have been filed with the secretary of state. They are:

To make it unlawful to take or fish for salmon or sturgeon otherwise than with hook in any of the waters of the Columbia or its tributaries, east of the mouth of Sandy river.

The second, to amend the constitution to provide that the most competent of permanent citizens of the county shall be chosen as jurors. Out of those attending court a jury shall be chosen by lot as grand jurors and taking five to find indictments. District attorney may file amended indictment, is original is defective.

Third, amending constitution providing under certain conditions (or proportional representation).

Four, providing for the recall of any public officer.

Five, compelling legislators to vote for and elect candidates for the United States senate receiving the highest number of votes.

Six, limiting candidates' election expenses, defining, preventing and punishing corrupt or illegal practices in nominations and elections, securing purity of the ballot, providing for forming information to electors, and for the manner of conducting contests.

Eighteen initiative petitions have been filed to date, and two more are in sight.

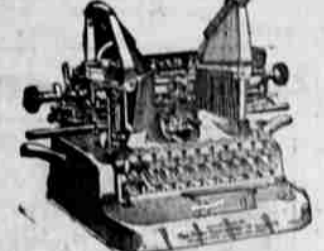
