## MANY PERSONS WORE CARNATION'S FOR M'KINLEY

In silent memory of a martyred public servant thousands of persons the country over yesterday wore a carnation, the favorite flower of William McKinley, on the sixty-sixth anniversary of his birth. This was the six annual observance of "Carnation Day," which in its simplicity is peculiarly appropriate as a memorial to the late president.

"The Carnation League of America," a memorial of sentiment," believes that McKinley's birthday was observed this year with greater unanimity than ever before. While the wearing of a carnation has been firmly established, the broad object of the league is to instill into the hearts of the people a desire for true patriotic observance of all national days, and, it is said, the efforts of the league along this line have brought about a noteworthy improvement.

It is interesting to know that scores of associations have been formed in different states, and have adopted the league's creed, which reads: "Believing that the future greatness of my country can best be assured by a growth of good citizenship among all the people, and that good citizenship may be promoted by keeping fresh in our hearts and minds the best traditions of the country, and that this can, in a measure, be

accomplished by a proper observance of all our national days, I charge myself from this time forward to give thoughtful consideration to the patriotic lesson presented by each such day, and to endeavor to have others do the same."

President McKinley's flower, the carnation or pink, is a native of southern Europe, and has been cultivated since ancient times. Originally of a blue purple tint, it has assumed a variety of hues and numerous combinations of form and color. Mr. McKinley was fond of the carnation because of its fragrance and delicate beauty, and by a happy thought the patriotic movement known as "Carnation Day" was instituted.

The Carnation League was established on January 29, 1903. It has headquarters at Dayton, Ohio, and numbers among its honorary trustees the president of the United States.

## SENATOR FULTON ASSERTS HENEY'S CHARGES ARE FALSE

Washington, Jan. 29.—When shown a synopsis of the charges made against him last evening by F. J. Henev, Senator Fulton was not inclined to make any response at this time. Finally, however, he said:

"I cannot, of course, answer Mr. Henev's charges until I have them in full, so that I know just what they are. I will say, however, that it is absolutely false that I ever paid J. S. Smith or any other person money for Mitchell. It was, I recall, a common report that Smith got money out of Mitchell on a promise to qualify as a legislator, and then refused to qualify. I do not recall saying anything to Governor Chamberlain about Smith, but if I did it was simply based on the generally believed report. "As for being attorney for the Hammond Lumber Company, I never was, except, I think, I once appeared in court for it. The Brownell matter I have before me. The Burke and Gosselin matter was simply a case where the parties were indicted and I was applied to to defend them. That was years before I was elected to the senate, and I was then engaged in the practice of law. I do not now recall all the circumstances, but know that my actions were all perfectly legitimate and proper, and when I see the allegations will easily refute any charges of impropriety. Mr. Henev must be desperate when he has to delve into the past to rake up scandal and filth of this character. I shall at the proper time deal with these charges and show their entire falsity."

## PLAN TO KIDNAP RUEF IS FOILED

San Francisco, Jan. 29.—An attempt to kidnap Abe Ruef from the county jail and spirit him away was unearched tonight by Sheriff Larry Dolan. The details of the plot were revealed by one of the guards who had seen the preparations. The plot was being engineered by the indicted magistrates, who recognize that they must get Ruef out of the way at all hazards to save themselves.

The sheriff tonight admitted that the discovery had been made in the nick of time. He doubled the guards at the prison tonight and placed special watchmen at Ruef's cell.

Ruef's Fate Is Decided. In the midst of the denunciations being heaped upon the graft prosecution by Patrick Calhoun and his fellows in indictment has come a clearer light showing that the prosecution stands at the present moment as strong as ever, if not stronger.

Abe Ruef's trial will be pressed with vigor. Then he will be sentenced to 14 years in prison. He may at once be placed on trial again and his sentence raised to 25 years. Then Patrick Calhoun will be put on trial and Ruef dragged from the prison to testify.

## BURTON WANTS TO BE ASSESSOR AGAIN

D. P. Burton, of this city, who until four years ago served as county assessor for a good many terms, today filed his petition for the nomination for that office at the primaries in April on the Republican ticket. Mr. Burton was beaten at the county convention four years ago for the post incumbent, who has also filed his petition for nomination. There promises to be a warm fight between the two men at the primaries.
