DELINQUENT SUBSCRIBERS MUST BE STOPPED

The Postmaster-General has just issued a drastic order which went into effect January 1, whereby subscribers to daily and weekly newspapers, monthly magazines and all periodicals entitled to second-class postage rates must pay their subscriptions practically up to date if they wish to receive the publication after January 1. The order does not leave any alternative to the publisher than to collect the subscription price or stop the paper. Publishers will not be permitted to send weekly papers to subscribers who are more than a year in arrears after July 1, 1908.
