AMUSEMENTS

Only a small audience witnessed the production of the "10,000 Beauty" at the Eugene theatre last night. It was not up to the usual standard of musical comedies and burlesque that have visited this city the present season.

In the performance of Antony and Cleopatra, which comes to the Eugene theatre on Friday, February 21, are a number of people whose names stand for recognized merit. Mr. Hanford, of course, is looked to for a great impersonation of Marc Antony, a role which he has studied in all its phases, and in whose exposition he is by many people accounted without a peer. Preparations for the scenic display which this marvelous drama so abundantly invites have been made on a magnificent scale. After a pictorial preface, as novel in idea as it is beautiful in execution, the curtain rises on a scene showing the portico of Cleopatra's palace, with the river Nile in the distance. As the curtain rises on new events in the action of the tragedy, new revelations of architecture and landscape, both Roman and Egyptian, are placed before the eye. Yet the spectacular splendors that have been so studiously worked out have not been allowed to cause indifference to the necessity of a good acting company. Many of the old favorites of Mr. Hanford's company are seen in responsible roles.

CITIZEN SOLDIERS

The National Guard Association of the United States has been trying for ten years to bring the National Guard up to the level of the regular force, and progress has been made in some of the states, though far from all that is desirable. In case of war the National Guard would be the first body of soldiery called out. At present it consists of 107,578 trained officers and men. The 65,000 regulars added give a total force for immediate service of 172,563 disciplined troops. What could be done in the way of volunteers reaches into millions, but this resource would not be at once available for the field.

Recently the state of Nevada called on the National government for a body of regulars to enforce the law of the state. Nevada does not support a single company of militia, nor could it furnish one in case of a foreign war. Its neglect of the National Guard has placed it in a humiliating position, but there are other states that are not much better off in militia matters. Oregon has reason to be proud of its guardsmen and the organization in this state is second to none in the country. The state is careful to see that its citizen soldiers get all that is contingently offered by the National government. Its National Guard is generally treated by the general public. The example is worthy, but few of the states have reached as high a standard.—EX.

THE DOCTOR OF OSTEOPATHY
