CONTRACT LET FOR F. C. POTTS BRICK BUILDING

V. McFARLAND AND A. L. BALL THE SUCCESSFUL BIDDERS—WORK ON STRUCTURE WILL BEGIN AT ONCE—PLANS FOR S. B. FINNEGAN'S BUILDING JOINING ALMOST READY

F. C. Potts the cigar manufacturer, today let the contract for the erection of his two-story brick block on Olive street between West Ninth and West Eighth to V. McFarland and A. L. Ball. The contract price is not given out.

Work on the structure will begin just as soon as the weather will permit. The lot will be surveyed tomorrow and immediately after that, if the rain ceases, the work of excavating for the building will commence.

The building will be 40x52 feet in dimensions. It will contain two store rooms on the ground floor, one of which will be occupied by Mr. Potts' cigar factory, and nine living rooms on the second floor, which will be occupied by his family.

The building will be handsome in design. It will be of semi-classical style, with a front similar to the Merchants' bank building. The front of the building will be cemented and on top, in the centre, will be a flagpole. The stairway will be in the centre of the building. Y. D. Henshall, the architect, furnished the plans and specifications.

Finnegan's Building. Mr. Henshall has the plans for S. B. Finnegan's two-story brick building, which will be located just south of the Potts building, about completed, and the contract for its erection will be let soon. The building will be something similar to that erected by Mr. Potts.

French Schools.

The quality of the secular instruction in the French schools seemed to me extraordinarily high. It happened, for example, that I was taken into a classroom where a lesson in English was being given to some French boys of sixteen, mostly the sons of operatives. The exercise was conducted in excellent English, which the pupils seemed to speak almost as readily as the teacher, and the point under discussion when I visited the class was one which would have puzzled Harvard freshmen. It was the distinction in meaning between the words priest—a Catholic ecclesiastic; clergyman—an Anglican, and minister—a dissenter. In American schools, or rather, in the results of the instruction there afforded, I have never come across the teaching of any foreign language which compared in efficiency with the teaching of English in secondary schools throughout France. And to all appearances this was only one example of the thoroughness and the vitality of French teaching in all its branches.—Barrett Wendell in "France of Today."

Chinese Sarcasm.

Once in awhile you meet a common Chinaman who has some of the native wit of his country. One such has a laundry in Lexington avenue, not far from Twenty-third street. The other day I heard him yell at a recalcitrant customer: "You no pay? Then you paper tiger?" I asked what he meant by a "paper tiger," and he replied, "Oh, in China a paper tiger is a blackguard who blows much, but is harmless!"

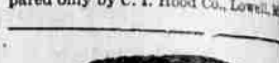
