PLANS FOR FINNEGAN BLOCK ARE COMPLETED

Architect Y. D. Hensill has completed the plans and specifications for S. B. Finnegan's new two-story brick block and they were delivered to Mr. Finnegan this afternoon. The contract will be let as soon as bids are handed in.
 This building will be erected just south of F. C. Potts' two-story brick on Olive street, near West Eighth, work on which will begin in a few days. It will be similar in design to the Potts building and will be 40x52 feet in dimensions. The entire lower floor of the building will be used by Mr. Finnegan for his blacksmith, wagon and machine shop and the upper story will be divided into eight living rooms, besides bath, toilets, closets, woodshed, etc. They will be occupied by Mr. Finnegan and wife. The building when completed will cost \$7000 or over.

 not been learned, but it is supposed to have been the result of differences which have existed between father and son for some time. The two men are reported to have had a quarrel several nights ago, when the father, it is reported, was compelled to resort to violence to restrain his son.
 Shot When He Rebukes Son
 Young Hargis had been drinking heavily of late. He went into the store late this afternoon and was apparently under the influence of liquor. Judge Hargis spoke to him about his drinking and a quarrel followed. Father and son stepped behind a counter in the store, when the son, after only a few minutes' conversation, drew a revolver and fired five shots. Four took effect, the noted mountain character falling dead. The young woman stenographer and the customers in the store fled in fright.
 Young Hargis was arrested and placed in jail. He was raving like a madman and the officers were compelled to drag him to jail.
 Hargis' Remedy Over a Coffin
 Judge Hargis will be buried in a casket which he himself purchased about a month ago. Some time during the early part of last month he went to the National Casket Company at Louisville and requested that he be shown the most elaborate coffin the company had in stock. Nothing suited him and he finally ordered one along his own ideas, costing \$1500.
