THE DOCTOR OF OSTEOPATHY

ANNUAL REPORT OF PRESIDENT OF UNIVERSITY

The annual report of the president of the University of Oregon for 1907, with the reports of the steward and registrar, have just been issued. The president's report shows that the University has made a gain of 23 per cent in enrollment this year over that of last. The funds have fallen short \$15,000 of meeting the current expenses of the year, and to avoid a deficiency the faculty served three months without pay. The work of the summer school and the correspondence school is discussed, and a recommendation is made for a bureau of research in economics, politics and sociology. An outline of the plans of the school of education for training high school teachers and principals is given, and attention is called to the gift to the University of a building and land by the citizens of North Bend, Or., for the establishment of a marine biological laboratory, for which Coos Bay offers exceptional advantages. The total registration, as shown by the registrar's report is 977 students, distributed as follows: Liberal arts, 298; engineering, 101; school of law, 87; school of medicine, 89; school of music, 126; correspondence school, 251; summer school, 25. The steward's report gives a complete statement of the University's finances for the year.
