## EUGENE BOOSTERS ENTERTAINED AT SPRINGFIELD

OVER A HUNDRED CITIZENS JOURNEYED TO SAWMILL CITY AND ATTENDED MEETING OF COMMERCIAL CLUB

LOVE FEAST HELD AND CITIZENS OF RESPECTIVE CITIES VIED WITH EACH OTHER IN PAYING COMPLIMENTS—MANY COMING OVER MONDAY

Last evening at 6:45 o'clock over 100 members of Eugene's Commercial Club boarded the "spec" that was in waiting to carry them to Springfield as guests of the Commercial Club of that town. Upon their arrival of the train the boosters from Eugene were met at the depot by Springfield's band and citizens. After three rousing cheers for Springfield the visitors formed in line and headed by Eugene's famous band sang the following song to the tune of "There'll be a Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight":

"When you come to Springfield, Oregon, They'll show you a bully lot of fun— And they will treat you right And show you all the sights— There'll be a hot time in Springfield That night."

Arriving at the Commercial Club hall, the meeting was called to order and the address of welcome made by Mayor M. M. Peary, of Springfield. In short the mayor said that it gave him a great deal of pleasure to welcome the Commercial Club of Eugene to their city. Eugene is known as the best town in the valley. (Applause.) Dr. Whitson was asked to take the chair and filled it in his usual graceful and capable way. Dr. Whitson said:

"We of Eugene have a feeling that you of Springfield are a part of us and we are a part of you."

John Kestley was then called upon by the chair for a few remarks, and said that he had hoped to see Eugene and Springfield brought closer together in both a social and commercial way, and hoped this meeting would be the means looking to that end.

Albert Walker, of Springfield, then responded and said from the demonstration that is shown here tonight "that we take it that you are our friends." (Applause.)

J. J. Bryan, of Springfield, in his closing remarks created considerable laughter by saying: "I am equally glad that you gentlemen of Eugene have the pleasure of living within three miles of Springfield."

John H. Hartog, of the Eugene Commercial Club, then made a pretty and witty speech during which he was often interrupted by applause.

D. E. Yoran treated on the finances of the Eugene Commercial Club, what they had accomplished and what they hoped to accomplish. It was brief but to the point.

Mr. Bassett, of Springfield, in referring to the climate of that town, said that it was never chilly there, as their neighboring city was dispensing enough "hot air" to keep them warm. (Laughter and applause.)

Judge Harris' speech, though not long, was very impressive and to the point, and probably received the greatest applause of the evening.

Mr. Bethlehem, of Springfield, made a few remarks and was followed by C. S. Williams, of Eugene, who kept his audience spellbound as he portrayed the wonderful resources and advantages that Lane county had, and more especially the opportunities that were knocking at Eugene's and Springfield's doors. At the conclusion of his speech the applause was deafening.

President Campbell, of the State University, made a very eloquent address on the needs of the University, which was received with marked approval.

B. A. Washburne, of Springfield, offered a resolution endorsing the appropriation of \$125,000 at the coming election for the University, which was carried unanimously.

Judge Calhoun, of Eugene, made a very witty comparison between St. Paul and Minneapolis, looking at them as they are today, practically two cities grown into one, and hoped to see the day that Eugene and Springfield would be expanded so that they would be one city.

The chair then called upon the Rev. Mr. Perkins, of Michigan, for a few remarks. Mr. Perkins, upon rising, said that it made the cold chills run up his back when he heard the name Michigan mentioned, after living out in this glorious climate of ours for two years, and he was perfectly contented to remain here.

Professor L. R. Alderman, of Eugene, in his closing remarks of the meeting, said that he could not only see a "Greater Eugene" but a "Greater Oregon" by the aid of the \$125,000 appropriation bill passing for the University.

Chairman Whitson then asked all the members of the Springfield Commercial Club who would be able to come to Eugene next Monday to rise and over thirty responded. The meeting then adjourned. It being pronounced by all present as the most enjoyable evening ever spent.

During the addresses a number of selections were rendered by the Eugene band. A very dainty luncheon was served in the banquet room and after the inner man was satisfied cigars were passed around and a general good time enjoyed until train time.

The Resolutions. The resolutions on the University appropriation were as follows: "Whereas, The interest of education

is one of the greatest importance to every citizen of the state of Oregon, whose through education the way is opened to every boy and girl in the state to broader opportunity and larger usefulness, and since the success of free government is necessarily founded on high intelligence and general enlightenment; and

Whereas, The State of Oregon is certain to be brought into great public prominence in all parts of the Union in June on account of its large use of direct legislation through the initiative and referendum, and consequently its attitude toward higher education as shown by the result of its vote on the University appropriation widely advertised in every section of the country; and

Whereas, we believe that it would be a calamity to educational interests of Oregon to cripple the University, which is the head of the system of free public education, and also a calamity to the state as a whole to advertise it to the home-seekers throughout the great Middle West as a state niggardly in its support of higher education; therefore be it

resolved, That we place ourselves on record as heartily favorable to the appropriation of \$125,000 to the University and pledge ourselves to do everything in our power both individually and collectively to insure the approval of the bill at the polls in June.

## ASSESSOR FACES SERIOUS PROBLEM

PROBLEM IS HOW TO ASSESS DOGS UNDER NEW OREGON LAW

A problem now worrying assessors of this part of the state is how to assess dogs. In accordance with the act of the last legislature declaring dogs to be personal property, the assessors are required to list them on the tax roll this year, and the way to classify, describe and value them is causing an extra expenditure of thought and is adding to the manifold burdens of the assessors. County Assessor B. F. Keeney, of Lane county, is collaborating with the makers of tax rolls in adjoining counties on the problem.

The main difficulty will be in describing this new class of property. "Rover, township 17 south, range 3 west," or "Tiger, lot 2, block 8, Skinner's addition to Eugene," are suggested forms. Or John Jones may be assessed with "one black water spaniel," or Mrs. Smith with "one bow-legged bulldog."

Dogs range in value from 10 cents to \$250, and it is expected the value will be lower about the first of March than at any other period of the year. The law under which the assessors are obligated to place dogs on the tax rolls is known as the shortest yet ever passed by an Oregon legislature. It was H. B. 271 at the session of 1907, and reads as follows: "Be it enacted by the people of the state of Oregon: Section 1. Dogs are hereby declared to be personal property."
