ASSESSMENT TO BE LEVIED ON HOP GROWERS

The most enthusiastic and largest meeting of hopgrowers held in this city since the organization of the Pacific Coast Hop Growers' Union has been under way, says the Salem Statesman. The police court room was filled to overflowing for two hours or more yesterday afternoon.

The subject was thoroughly discussed pro and con, and some good ideas were advanced. It appeared to be the general sentiment of the meeting that the union should not be abandoned, and that the movement must be carried through at any cost.

The various plans of raising money to carry on the work having been considered, a resolution was passed that an assessment of 25 cents per acre should be levied on every grower that has signed the articles of the association, the money to be used for the purpose of putting some practical men in the field to push the work of securing more signers.
