# FORMER EUGENE ATTORNEY GAINS FAME AS ORATOR

The following address was delivered at the organization of a Bryan Club at Mattoon, Ill., on Feb. 8, and reported in the Mattoon Morning Star. It is of local interest because Andrew L. Chezem is the son of Mr. H. Chezem of this city, and formerly practiced law here. He was called upon for an address and spoke as follows, according to the Star's report:

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen: "We will have no King, save Righteousness" was the slogan of a nation of old, and it succeeded.

We, as a modern nation, will have no leader, whose moral sensibilities are blinded or undeveloped. The salvation, the redemption of our nation from the snares of evil men, from the follies of the unscrupulous, and its security from like dangers in the future, depends upon our labor as the great Democratic party in bringing forth, in the individual whom we shall offer for office, character.

And our political success will depend upon how well we point by our candidatorial choices, to high and noble sentiments, sincere and religious determinations for the betterment of mankind.

The time has passed when, if men asked for a fish they might safely be given a stone, or when if they asked for bread, would silently accept a scorpion.

The time has passed when men will allow others to think for them, much less act for them, without holding them to the strictest accountability, or without at once demanding supreme fitness for the place.

The United States and the world, now verge upon a sublime and united demand for individual freedom, for a practical democracy.

Happily, in the United States, the time has come when every man, guarded in the sacred cloister of his voting booth, as he casts his eye over an untrammelled ballot, sees well photographed thereon the images of each individual member of his family or himself, and the voice of that ballot, happily, is to be, no longer the voice of the low political or of any dictator, whomsoever, save that exalted dictator, an aroused conscience, speaking, the voters aroused consciousness of his relation to his fellowman. It is to be the voice of brother calling unto brother, and in echoing tones, shall consummate the joining of the hands of common men in the common cause of duty, and intelligent right, the glory of manhood asserting itself.

The age of intelligent freedom among common men has dawned, it has been a Bryan, a Tolstol, a Roosevelt, a John Mitchell, a Polk, a Burns, who have each in their turn and in their own peculiar way, by untiring effort, called the sleeping victims of plutocratic vice, from the lethargic grasp of an indolent sleep, and aided by a willing and progressive pulpit in America have pointed the world to its higher duty.

Moses commanded that the laws be written by each individual household, upon the corner posts of his house, that the laws of morality and virtue, should be established, and become the law of the land, and it was so. And the Moses who shall guide the destinies of our republic must have the power to bind the laws of morality and virtue about the mind and engrave them upon the heart of the individual citizens of our nation, until they become the law of the land, throughout this land, and he must be as fearless to do right as that Moses of old; there can be with us no middle ground.

We have a peerless leader, one whose fitness and whose fidelity to the common man has ever been of the impeccable kind, which is common only among the immortals and among martyrs, he is the great reformer; the peer of the world; in his honor we organize, tonight; in his honor we organize, William Jennings Bryan.

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## AMUSEMENTS

In the representation of that marvelous poem-passage, Antony and Cleopatra. In selecting this play, Mr. Hanford carries out a definite scheme of chronology. His production of Julius Caesar last year told the story of Antony the orator and warrior. This season will reveal him as the lover. In Antony and Cleopatra Miss Wilson is cast as Cleopatra, a role whose possibilities are limitless. The constant play of emotion in this strange revelation of complex possibilities of a woman's nature calls for the utmost powers that an actress can command. As tender in her devotion as Juliet, as winsome when she so wills to be as Viola, as vivacious of mind as Beatrice, she is as terrible, when roused to tragic determination as Lady Macbeth. Antony is far from being the consistent hero that strict moral standards would demand. Indeed, the majority of Shakespeare's most prominent characters would scarcely pass muster as invariable examples of youth. But Antony is nevertheless a great man, one who is worshipped by his friends, feared by his foes. The passion which warped his career under different circumstances and with another object have been a virtue instead of a fault. As it was, he paid a heavy and relentless penalty for his one weakness.

"Antony and Cleopatra" will be Mr. Hanford's play at the Eugene theatre on Friday, February 21.

# NOORIS-ROWE ONLY BIG SHOW TO TOUR WEST

Much has been said and printed relative to the combine which was made last year in which the big circuses of this country were amalgamated. Before Norris & Rowe entered into the agreement they gave the subject great thought. It has been their aim always to give the public a clean, moral, refined performance, and that they succeeded in this is best illustrated by their past success. Wishing to give the public more for its money each year has been a constant problem that they have worked on incessantly. When the powers that be of the big combine approached Norris & Rowe and invited them to participate in the benefits to be derived from the union, they gave the matter further consideration.
