MAY START GLASS FACTORY IN PORTLAND

GUSTAVE MATHIESON, FORMERLY OF COBURG PLANT, MAY ENTER THE BUSINESS IN THE METROPOLIS

According to the Portland Telegram Gustave Mathieson, formerly of the Coburg glass works, may start a factory in Portland. Mathieson was in Eugene recently trying to interest citizens here in a similar proposition. The Telegram says:

"For the purpose of starting a glass factory in Portland Gustave Mathieson, of Coburg, is now in consultation with the manufacturers' committee of the Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Mathieson has been operating a glass factory in Coburg for several months, and finds it necessary to expand in order to even partially supply the market of the region tributary to this city. He now proposes to erect a plant to cost about \$15,000 on a tract of four acres in order to go into the manufacture of fruit jars and lamp chimneys on a large scale.

"I have been confining myself to the manufacture of lamp chimneys at the Coburg factory," Mr. Mathieson says, "but there is big money in the manufacture of lamp chimneys and jars for what the freight costs from the East, and then make a handsome profit."

"The material used in the manufacture of glass is plentiful in the region tributary to this city, and can be gotten together quite cheaply. We use silica sand, saltpeter and soda ash, and with these ingredients can turn out a superior article. For window glass we have to obtain a little better quality of silica, but that can be found adjacent to Portland as well. To make window glass would require a larger plant than I contemplate, however."

THE DOCTOR OF OSTEOPATHY
