WILLIAM BROWNLEE
PASSES BEYOND
BELOVED AND PUBLIC-SPIRITED CITIZEN DIED LAST NIGHT AFTER A SHORT ILLNESS
William Brownlee, a well-known and beloved citizen of this city, died at his home in Fairmount last night at 11 o'clock after a short illness of a gripe, complicated with asthma and bronchitis. He had been up and around the house during the afternoon and had eaten dinner with the family, but in the night he was taken suddenly ill and passed away peacefully.
Mr. Brownlee was born at Glasgow, Scotland, March 4, 1832. He came to America at the age of 16 years, settling in Canada. Later he came to the United States and was married to Miss Alice Patterson on December 14, 1856. She still survives him. He leaves the following children: Mrs. Albert O. Clark, of Rogers, Ark.; Thos. S. Brownlee, of St. Louis; Mrs. W. S. Mateer, of Nampa, Idaho; Harry B. Brownlee, of Minneapolis, Kan.; Mrs. Jeffrey Sage, of Forest City, S. D.; Mrs. A. L. Fields, of St. Louis, and Mrs. Walter F. Mateer, of Kokomo, S. D.
Mr. and Mrs. Brownlee came to Eugene from Kansas four or five years ago. Mr. Brownlee has always led a quiet and unassuming life, but nevertheless he was a public spirited citizen and always worked hard for the good of the community in which he resided. He was a member of the Methodist church and was for years an Odd Fellow.
The funeral arrangements have not yet been completed, but it is probable that the burial will take place Thursday.
