## MANY BUSINESS HOUSES WILL SOON CHANGE LOCATIONS

FIRMS COMPELLED TO MOVE ON ACCOUNT OF BUILDING IMPROVEMENTS—KUYKENDALL'S DRUG STORE, LEARNED'S MILLINERY STORE AND OTHERS WILL HAVE NEW QUARTERS

Many business firms will change locations within the next few weeks, made necessary by the erection of new buildings where some are located and the remodeling of others where some are now doing business. Principal among the changes is that of W. A. Kuykendall's drug store, which will be moved to the Pickett building, in the room now occupied by Miss Learned's millinery store, and D. S. McDougall's tailor shop. This change will be made by the 1st of April, as the First National Bank will begin the work of enlarging its building at that time, consolidating its present banking quarters with the room now occupied by the drug store. Miss Learned will move into the room now being vacated by M. Svarverud's real estate office in the Coleman building, one door north of the Hovey building. Mr. Svarverud will occupy a portion of the former quarters of the Chambers-Bristow bank, which have been leased by I. H. Bingham, J. O. Storey and Attorney F. M. DeNeffe, and have moved into it. Mr. McDougall has not yet decided upon a location.

Another change will be that of the University Bakery salesroom, now occupying the frame building in the old Rhinehart building on East Ninth street, which will occupy the new Hullin block which is now in course of erection. The building now occupied by the bakery will probably soon be moved away or torn down to make room for the Old Fellows' five-story block, which has been mentioned frequently by The Guard, and which will probably be erected during the coming spring and summer.

Other changes are being talked of, but are not given for publication for the reason that no definite decision has been made.

## JUNCTION CITY VOTES FOR NEW SCHOOL

Junction City, Or., Feb. 18.—At the election held here yesterday the proposition to bond the school district for \$6000 for a new high school building was carried, 79 for and 2 against.

It is the intention to build with four rooms on the lower floor and use the entire upstairs for the assembly hall. Six years ago the present school building of four rooms was sufficient, but now eight rooms are required.

## THE DOCTOR OF OSTEOPATHY

## U. OF O. GETS 15,000 PLANT SPECIMENS

The University of Oregon has just been made the recipient of a collection of botanical specimens, comprising about 15,000 specimens, many of which are very rare and valuable. This herbarium was presented to the University by Mr. Leberg, who has been connected with the United States department of agriculture for many years. Most of the specimens are duplicates of plants collected by Mr. Leberg for the government, the originals having been filed with the government in the national herbarium at Washington. The collection embraces plants from California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, North and South Dakota, Arizona, Iowa, Minnesota and many foreign plants. Each specimen is named and ready to mount, and all the plants are in fine condition.

From 1893 to 1896 Mr. Leberg was assistant in the United States department of agriculture; from 1897 to 1901 he was field assistant in the geological survey department, working only in the forest reserves; in 1902 he was superintendent in the Bitter Root forest reserve; in 1903 he was again field assistant of the geological service; in 1904-05 he was forester and forest inspector in the Philippines, and in 1906 he was forest expert in the United States bureau of forestry. Mr. Leberg is now living on the McKenzie river and is making a collection of mosses which he intends to donate to the University also.

Some of the plants were collected as far back as 1880, and it is doubtful if it would be possible to replace the collection for \$10,000. This gift is a great help to the biological department, and is greatly appreciated by the faculty.
