To the Editor:— I see by the Sunday Morning Register "That the County Fair is Assured" that the committee has decided on Huddleston tract; that it will secure 195 acres at the contract price of \$49,000, \$10,000 to be paid in cash and the balance at 6 per cent interest. Assuming that this proposed purchase is for the county and not a private investment, and that it is of interest to all the taxpayers of the county. I hereby offer the committee 105 acres at the price of \$20,000; \$7,500 to be paid in cash on the delivery of the deed and the balance to be paid in a reasonable time, with interest at 6 per cent per annum, payable annually. HARTOG ATTENDS THE BIG BOOSTER MEETING AT SALEM

John H. Hartog, manager of the Commercial Club, is home from Salem, where he attended the meeting there Wednesday night, held to celebrate the opening of the new electric railway between that city and Portland. Mr. Hartog says the meeting was very enthusiastic and of every speaker, this city and Portland being the only outside places which had representatives on the program. The Salem Journal, in its writeup of the meeting, says:

"John Hartog, the Eugene booster, told of that town which had 3000 in 1900, 5000 in 1905 and would have over 10,000 in 1908. He quoted from a Portland paper to prove that Tom Richardson had failed to raise any money at Salem for a booster campaign, and made a strong plea for the annual appropriation for the State University of \$125,000 a year. He did not see how the state could grow if the people turned down money needed for higher education. This was received with great applause."

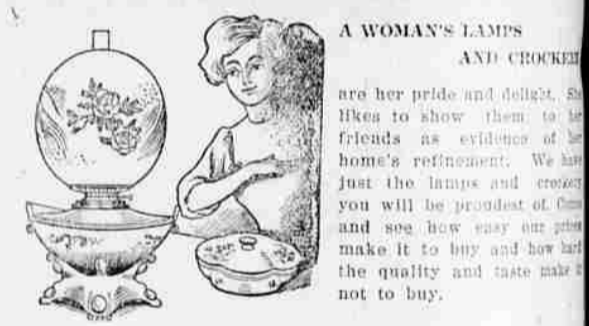
