### HORACE M'KINLEY PASSED THROUGH THIS MORNING

### FAMOUS LAND FRAUDER ARRIVES IN PORTLAND TODAY—STORY OF HIS ESCAPE FROM CHINESE PRISON AND SUBSEQUENT RECAPTURE

Horace G. McKinley, who was brought back to America from China by Detective Kerrigan, of Portland, to stand trial for land fraud, passed through Eugene on this morning's early train for Portland. A press dispatch from San Francisco tells of his escape from the jail in China as follows:

"Since McKinley's arrival it has developed that the famous outlaw band of Hung Hu Tse was the parent of the land transfer's escape from a prison cell at Mukden. Until he got word that a special request for his extradition had been made to the Chinese government by the United States McKinley had been quite confident of regaining his liberty by resisting extradition, knowing that there was no treaty making it incumbent upon the Chinese to give him up. With this news came the information that the request was very likely to be granted through governmental courtesy.

No McKinley began action. He arranged word to Mukden leaders of the Hung Hu Tse and was told his rescue would be effected on the night of November 11. This was last fall. Following instructions McKinley left a dummy of himself in a hole in the wall made for him by members of the outlaw society.

Weeks of trying experiences followed, for the Chinese officers showed that for once they were really in earnest about catching an American fugitive, and it required the maximum of skill on the part of the Hung Hu Tse to keep him out of sight. During days he often hid in a Chinese coffin; by night he got exercise and air by masquerading as a Russian girl in female garb. Chinese officers finally concluded he had left Mukden and this gave him an opportunity to actually get away from the town. So he fled to Harbin, where he expected to take the train for the interior. He wore a Russian tourist's clothes. McKinley would probably have been in the interior from Harbin yet had not the Russian who sold the tourist's outfit realized that he could make another haul by betraying McKinley. He had heard of the \$1000 reward offered by the Chinese when the man should be captured.

The average number of cows was 14; milk produced, 98,463 pounds of cream, 12,892; pounds of butterfat, 2938.1-2; net value, \$1184.27. Lowest price of butterfat, per pound, 20 cents; highest price, 26.1-2 cents; average price per pound, 20 cents. There is no better evidence than these figures to prove that dairymen in this valley pay well, and many of our farmers would do well to put up the dairy, and if they are not now so, the increase of price would do well to get the best of some good way and see the result.
