Resolutions Adopted.
Whereas, Our beloved founder, fellow worker and father of C. E. Dr. Francis E. Purpose meeting.
A large crowd was in attendance at the Christian church last evening; the second evening of the convention. The delegates were allowed the middle section of the church, these being reserved. The scripture readings were given by Rev. O. C. Wright, of the Baptist church. After a splendid selection by the Presbyterian choir, Rev. W. H. Poulson, of the First Presbyterian church of Portland, was introduced. His theme was "The Heart of Christian Endeavor."

He likened himself to a surgeon, who cuts to the heart of a patient. If any criticism hurts them it is only because the pain is necessary for the correcting of Christian Endeavor. "Where is the heart of Christian Endeavor?" This has accomplished much in the United Society of Christian Endeavor. It has accomplished much in breaking down denominational prejudices and provided uniform lessons. But with all these it is not the heart of Christian Endeavor; it is a corporation, a mere machine for carrying out certain plans and purposes.

"Is the heart of C. E. in the great conventions? They have furnished enthusiasm and methods."
"Is it committee organization of the society? Is it the great body of average members? Is it a pledge? A society without a pledge is only a kind of a society. I believe in covenants—I believe in the pledge. No, the pledge is only the backbone of Christian Endeavor."
The real heart of Christian Endeavor is the Lord Jesus Christ, throbbing continually and sending out power far beyond any united society. But this heart is one that can be wounded.
"Now that we have found the heart what shall we do to cure the disease of the heart of Christian Endeavor? Will new methods (more bodily members) do it? Will a saline solution?"
The things Christian Endeavor needs is to make Christ king in the lives of the individual Endeavorers; to witness His saving power and with our eyes to look for His coming."

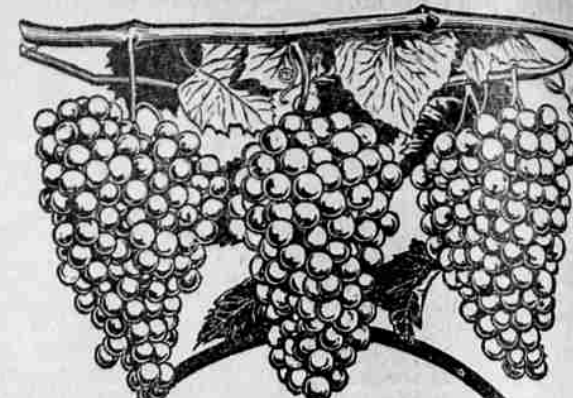
