ENDEAVOR CONVENTION COMES TO CLOSE

THREE AFTERNOON MASS MEETINGS HELD AND GENERAL MASS MEETING IN EVENING—PRESIDENT HURD SUBMITS HIS ANNUAL REPORT TO CONVENTION

The state Y. P. S. C. E. convention closed last night with a mass meeting at the Christian church. The large auditorium was filled with people to listen to the address of President H. M. Crooks, of Albany College, who spoke eloquently and to the point.

In the afternoon there were three simultaneous meetings, one at the Christian church for men and addressed by Rev. A. J. Folsom, another at the United Brethren church for women, addressed by Miss Bessie Luckey, who has recently returned from the world's Sunday school convention at Jerusalem, and the third at the Congregational church for Sunday school children, addressed by Miss Lucilla Knapp.

Several of the visiting ministers occupied the pulpits of a number of the churches at the morning services.

President's Report.
At the business session of the convention Saturday afternoon President Hurd submitted his annual report as follows:
My Dear Fellow Endeavorers:

My report to you must in the necessity of the case be brief. At the convention held in Corvallis two years ago Rev. D. A. Thomson was elected to the office of president, but in a few weeks had to resign on account of ill health. The executive committee then selected Rev. L. M. Boozer, my worthy predecessor, who served the Endeavorers of the state in that capacity until last July, when, on account of his removal to our neighbor state of Idaho, he, too, resigned. The interim between that time and the present has been filled by the present incumbent.

During the seven months that have now elapsed our efforts have been directed principally to three things: (1) to get in touch with the various district officers and their work; (2) to secure a correct and official register of all the societies in the state, and (3) to make arrangements for this convention.

After making a reorganization of the district unions, he makes the following recommendations:

Our state ought to share in the joys and privileges that will come to Endeavorers when the headquarters building for the United Society is erected in Boston. To bring this to completion the "Builders' Union" was organized during the international convention at Seattle last summer and a superintendent has been appointed for it. Oregon has been asked to raise one thousand shares of \$5 each for its share, and I would be glad to see this convention appoint some one to be our superintendent for this work.

Then, too, our state ought to swing into line in the "increase and betterment" campaign. "The fields are white to the harvest"—new societies ought to be rejuvenated, and each and every district line of Christian Endeavor activity ought to be reinforced and pushed to a larger and better service for "our Lord and Master." In the words of another, "We can do it if we will."

We believe that the department of Junior Christian Endeavor in our state organization ought to be enlarged to include the intermediate societies also.

The executive committee believes it to be a good plan that in the choice of vice presidents one should be chosen from each of the denominations affiliating in the state union.

Many lines of activity are pressing in on every hand crying to be given their share of attention. How we long to answer, and perhaps are long we can. "The future is as bright as the promises of God." It ways are bright with promise. Its possibilities are great. Souls are hungry for the fellowship of Christian men and women. The world is calling for you and me. "Let us then be up and doing"—going forth during the next biennium to the grandest era Christian Endeavor has ever seen in our state.

G. C. BROWNELL DENIES STATEMENTS MADE BY FULTON

Representing what he declares to be false charges, George C. Brownell, ex-state senator from Clackamas county, has taken a hand in the controversy between Francis J. Heney and Senator Fulton, says the Portland Oregonian. Brownell jumped in to the fray yesterday, after reading Fulton's reply to Heney's first Congressional church speech. In that reply Fulton charged Brownell with duplicity in various political matters, including insinuation that the ex-political leader of Clackamas county gave perjured testimony at the recent Hall conspiracy trial in return for a promise of an immunity bath from the government.

Brownell charges that in replying to Heney Fulton has gone out of his way to make an unfair and uncalled-for attack on him (Brownell), in an attempt unnecessarily to involve Brownell in the Heney-Fulton controversy. He is denied emphatically by Brownell that he has been promised immunity by Heney, and he declares that he testified truly in every detail as a witness for the government in the trial of Hall. He denies that he at any time charged Fulton with being party to a conspiracy with Hall whereby Brownell was to be protected from indictment and prosecution for alleged complicity in the Oregon land frauds.

His Reply in Brief.
Makes general denial of charges made against him by Senator Fulton in reply to Heney.

Emphatically denies that he has been promised immunity by Heney for having testified at the Hall trial. Denies that he has ever charged Fulton with having been party to a conspiracy with Hall by which Brownell was not to be prosecuted for alleged complicity in the Oregon land frauds.

Re-asserts that he returned to Fulton several letters written by Fulton to him, together with Hall's telegram to Brownell from Washington.

Insists that he did not surrender to representatives of the government the famous Mitchell-Fulton letter until long after Heney was in possession of the same letter transcribed from the stenographer's notes.

Intimates that he may make other interesting disclosures of the inside political history of the state if his erstwhile political associates do not desist in their attacks.

WRECKED TRAIN CARRIED \$1,000,000

Twenty boarders in the upper stories had narrow escapes.

SERIOUS RUNAWAY ACCIDENT OCCURS THIS MORNING

L. S. HILL'S LEG BROKEN AND FRED BROCKMAN BRUISED AND SCRATCHED—HORSES BECAME FRIGHTENED AT A PASSING FREIGHT TRAIN

L. S. Hill, logging superintendent for the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company, and Fred Brockman, foreman of the Foss logging camp on the upper Willamette river, were the victims of a serious runaway accident this morning. They started out from Eugene in a buggy for the Foss camp, leading Brockman's saddle horse behind. As they reached Judkins Point, between Eugene and Springfield, a freight train came along and frightened the saddle horse, which became unmanageable, and surmounting an embankment jumped between the two horses hitched to the buggy. This caused the other two horses to run, and the occupants were thrown forcibly to the ground and dragged a considerable distance. Hill's right leg was broken just above the ankle and Brockman was badly bruised and scratched, but his injuries are not serious.

A telephone message was sent to the Booth-Kelly office immediately after the accident, and Geo. H. Kly, and H. A. Dunbar secured a cab and drove to the scene of the runaway. They brought the injured men to town and Mr. Hill was placed in the Eugene hospital. Brockman was taken to his home.
One of Hill's horses hitched to the buggy was badly hurt by being cut with barbed wire, the team having run into a fence along the roadside. The animal received terrible cuts on one side of its body, and it is thought that its usefulness is ruined.

LIQUOR INTERESTS ORGANIZE TO FIGHT PROHIBITION
Chicago, Feb. 22.—Battle is to be offered prohibition in every city, town and county of the United States through the medium of a vast National federation, with executive headquarters in Chicago, and composed of every association connected directly or indirectly with the liquor trades. This was the formal announcement made today by John A. McDermott, manager of the organization bureau of the protest.

Arrangements for the liquor trades and societies to join hands in a stupendous campaign against prohibition have been under way for several months, but it has not been felt that the time was ripe for a public announcement of what, it is declared, will be the most remarkable fight yet undertaken in this country by a single industry. The general plans have now been formulated, however, and accordingly have been made public.
