QUICKSILVER MINING IN WESTERN OREGON

OFFICIAL GOVERNMENT PUBLICATION TELLS OF MINERAL RESOURCES OF STATE—BLACK BUTTE MINES AND WHAT HAS BEEN DONE THERE IN THE WAY OF DEVELOPMENT BY COMPANY NOW OWNING AND OPERATING PROPERTY.

In the 1906 volume of "Mineral Resources of the United States," just issued by the United States Geological Survey, the following is said regarding the quicksilver resources of Oregon.

"Oregon has been a small producer for several years, but in 1906 had not been for a new producing property, its production would have been nothing. The main operator in 1906 was the Almaden Gold and Quicksilver Company at Howard, Crook county. The most extensively developed property in the state, the Black Butte mine, which also had a thorough equipment with a special furnace and retort is understood to have remained idle. Considerable prospecting was carried on in Jackson, Josephine, and Douglas counties, and several occurrences of ore of good grade are reported. The greatest activity was in the Meadows District mines in Jackson county, where a depth of 400 feet is stated to have been reached and a furnace and retort erected."

"At the Black Butte quicksilver mine in Lane county, Oregon, an experimental furnace, designed by and named after the general manager of that property, and known as the Dennis roasting furnace, was built in 1905, but was not operated in 1906, as the mine was not producing. It was constructed to secure, at minimum cost, perfect combustion for a large tonnage of low grade ore. The small furnace comprised a series of primary and secondary combustion chambers and a number of other special devices, including one for preventing loss by the escape of gas. In test runs it is reported to have afforded a thorough roast of ore and volatilization of values in four hours, and to have eliminated practically all loss through flue dust."

Later information may be added to the above as follows:

During the year 1907, the Black Butte mine, referred to above, was equipped with a new and extensive plant consisting of hydro-electric power and lighting plant; a crushing plant composed of the buildings and ore bins, arranged on the gravity plan, having a storage capacity of 500 tons, and crushing capacity of 200 tons per day for 12 hours, equipped with a Sturtevant coarse ore crusher and Gates gyratory fine ore crusher; a new special designed dryer built of brick, concrete and iron, having a capacity of 125 tons; and a special condensing plant, constructed and arranged after the special design of the manager of the property, which successfully discharges the furnace gases at or below atmospheric temperature, thereby insuring perfect condensation and no loss of silver, either chemically or mechanically. The old Scott furnace on the property has been re-modeled, and further improved by the addition of a specially designed wood-gas producer. The draft is produced by two No. 70 Sturtevant exhausters direct connected to a 35 h. p. variable-speed motor, and so arranged that one or both can be operated at one time.

The entire plant is constructed and arranged after the design of the patents recently granted by the United States and all important countries, to W. B. Dennis, the manager of the property, which was the outgrowth of the experimental work referred to by the above quotation from the U. S. Government report.

The new plant at Black Butte was started up February 1st, and its operation up the present is said to have been most satisfactory. Quicksilver is reduced from the crude ore into pure metal in market form, and is shipped in wrought iron bottles in car loads to New York.

Quite an imposing looking village has grown up in Black Butte, 42 miles south of Eugene, as a result of this industry. The mine is owned largely by Mr. Dennis and Portland and Seattle associates. It is one of the heavy tax-payers of Lane county, and is becoming one of the important industries of the state.

FINED \$20 AND GIVEN TEN DAYS IN JAIL

JONES, WHO JUMPED BOARD BILL, PLEADS GUILTY AND WILL SPEND 20 DAYS IN LIMBO.

H. E. Jones, the man who jumped his board bill at the Hoffman House Thursday, owing over \$18, and who was arrested in Douglas county Saturday, appeared in Justice of the Peace Bryson's court this morning and pleaded guilty. He was fined \$20 and given a sentence of ten days in the county jail. Failing to pay the fine, he will serve ten days besides the ten days' sentence imposed upon him. Jones, whose real name is Berger, evidently got wind of the fact that he was wanted by the officers and boarded a hog train at Roseburg and went as far south as Hildes before the officers caught him. He was taken back to Roseburg and turned over to Constable Plank, of this city, who went out to get him.

SOUTHERN OREGON COMPANY IS SUED.

Contending that applicants for land of the Coos Bay wagon road grant should have the right to buy the land in 160-acre tracts at a price not exceeding \$2.50 an acre, 86 applicants have brought suit in the United States Circuit Court against the present possessor of the land—the Southern Oregon Company, whose chief stockholders are William W. Crapo, William J. Ketch, Elijah Smith and Prosper W. Smith, residents of New York and Boston. These applicants want a total of 17,000 acres out of 92,000 held by the company. Another suit will be filed next week for some 1700 acres more.
