BUTTE CELESTIAL GETS EDUCATION, BECOMES ENGINEER

Carrying a theodolite, with a note book in the outside pocket of his oriental jacket, a studious look in his eye and an air of setter-like fixity of purpose, a Chinaman has been scanning the hills back of the School of Mines for the entire summer, says the Butte (Mont.) Evening News.

He was no favored son of the moon, no high born mandarin, no rich man's son, neither was he anybody's servant. He carried the theodolite for no one but himself. Hum Ku Chee, who for years, like Irish Heap, has been one of the lowly of Butte, serving noodles, getting out the wash-washes, or selling vegetables from the great wicker baskets.

Saved and Worked. By incessant saving, ceaseless economy and tireless energy, Hum Ku Chee, poor but ambitious, a Chinaman but industrious, a servant but dignified, has succeeded in securing his degree as civil engineer from the International Correspondence School at Scranton, Pa.

There are more glorious possibilities in store for Hum Ku Chee. He leaves for China, where he will at once enter the service of the Chinese government and will undertake the work of a national survey, which, up to this time has never been completed or thoroughly carried out by the subjects of the empire dowager.

When most Chinamen were playing fan-tan in the gambling houses of West Galena and West Mercury streets, or smoking opium in the hunkies of many a Chinese hotel, Hum was craning by the light of a rush dip in his dingy cabin the same problems which Euclid designed to puzzle the wits of a succeeding generation.

48 Years Old. That Hum, and he is 48 years old, succeeded in his studies, may best be gathered by the fact that when he took his examination he received 99 per cent in geometry and trigonometry, and not less than 95 in any other study.

Hum is bright—bright as a dollar, and there has been no intellectual impediment in his education. His lack of knowledge of the English language has been the only stumbling block in his career. Nevertheless Hum's English is passable, but the technical terms worry him until he becomes familiar with them.

T. M. Erading, division superintendent of the I. C. S., takes great pride in his pupil. Hum is the brightest boy he has ever had him enrolled as a student in August, 1906, in mapping and surveying, and finished it with credit in November, 1907.

He immediately enrolled in a course of civil engineering, which he finished February 4, 1908, and received his diploma.

Did Field Work. All summer Hum has worked around the School of Mines, viewing with wonder that school of learning where the more favored made less progress, and which proved that "to learning there is no royal road."

He drove transits, flared cuts and fills and laid an entire city addition, graded streets and flared on sewers west of the city on the barren hills. Laboriously he drove his posts and spikes until he had demonstrated to his own satisfaction the practice and theory of his studies.

China is painfully deficient in engineers. The government up to a short time ago has been negligent of the most primitive means of surveying. Hum is going to be a wheel in the machine of progress that the sleeping and flowery kingdom is going to start in motion.

From his miserable home at 102 China alley he is going to occupy governmental offices at Peking, and he will be given a send-off that will make his 50-year-old heart feel like a boy's.

LARGE ADDITION TO CALIFORNIA FOREST

(Special Correspondence.) Washington, Feb. 21.—The president has just signed a proclamation creating additions amounting to nearly 500,000 acres to the Modoc National forest in northeastern California. With the exception of a small area in the northern part of Lassen county, all the lands put within the forest by this proclamation are situated in Modoc county. The exact area of the additions is 570,999 acres, which brings the total area of the forest up to 859,018 acres. The land proclaimed a part of the Modoc forest will be put under administration at once, with Supervisor C. E. Rafter, whose headquarters is at Alturas, California, in charge. The additions to the forest have a stand of valuable yellow pine, which will amount of several million feet. It will average 12,000 feet to the acre. There is little or no agricultural land in the addition.

LOWELL ITEMS.

(Special Correspondence.) Lowell, Feb. 24.—Farmers are busy seeding. Every available acre is being utilized.

The Hyland hop vines are being grubbed. No more hop picking in the old Lowell hop fields. Hereafter 40 acres of rich hop land will produce grain from year to year, instead of hops.
