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to regain their prestige the Wayne incident goes far to show, while the jury's verdict may be taken as an indication that the honest, upright official has little fear from such methods as are usually directed against him if he is fearless enough to defy them openly and rest his case in the hands of his fair-minded fellow citizen. Too many good men lack the bold, aggressive fighting qualities possessed by Dr. Lane, and their influence and standing suffer thereby. Only a man who felt secure in the knowledge of his complete innocence would have pushed this case to a conclusion in the courts, giving the blackmailers no quarter and asking none for himself.

There must be a lot of places along the shores of South America which are not on the school geographies. Almost every day the battleship fleet stops at some place we have never heard of before. But that is a big country, composed principally of revolutions and a desire on the part of the inhabitants to slay the men in power. But in this respect South America is not so much different from the people of the northern portion of the continent. They have a different way of accomplishing their ends, which is the sole difference.

The candidacy of W. S. U'Ren for United States senator will add materially to the safety of the campaign. And it looks very much as if the champion of popular legislation might repeat the achievement of Jonathan Bourne, Jr., leaving Senator Fulton and Judge Calkins at the nucleus of a "has been" political club after the votes cast in the Republican primary are counted.

The Guard prints today a special message of President Roosevelt to congress on the subject of improvement of inland waterways. This is a subject fraught with much importance to the whole people, and the policy of the administration, as outlined in this message, will be generally approved as a step toward the beginning of a work of national scope, already too long delayed.

Whiteaw Read characterizes as "yellow moonshine" the talk of Great Britain's helping Japan in case of war with the United States. It's news to us that Mr. Reid is an expert on "moonshine" colors. We had supposed that for many years he had confined himself exclusively to champagne.

The man out of a job determines the scale of wages. The sum which he names in his fear of STARVATION as the price for which he will sell his labor is that for which the man inside the gates must be content to toil.

It is objected that Socialists would put mankind on a DEAD LEVEL NOW. Socialists would give to them what in reality they earn — TO EACH ACCORDING TO HIS INDUSTRY AND HIS CAPACITY.
