### MANY NARROW ESCAPES FROM TENEMENT FIRES

New York, Feb. 27.—Two were burned so severely they may die, a dozen severely hurt and scores rescued from perilous positions by firemen at two early morning fires today. Although in widely separated sections it is believed that both fires were of incendiary origin.  
The most serious fire was in a tenement at 43 East First street, where the firemen rescued many scantily clad men, women and children from fire escapes, and a man and his daughter, who inhaled the flames, are in a critical condition.  
The other fire was in an apartment house at 247 East One Hundred and Fortieth street, where forty persons were removed from the burning building by the policemen and firemen.

### COPPER SUPPLY OF UNITED STATES ENTIRELY SOLD

New York, Feb. 27.—Thus far in February the United Metals Selling Company has sold 89,000,000 pounds of copper, the bulk of it to Great Britain and Germany. These sales have cleaned up the surplus of the concerns which dispose of their product through the United Selling Company, and it is stated that there is less refined copper on hand in the United States than at any time in many years.  
The copper brought prices averaging slightly under 13 cents.

### ARGUMENTS FOR VOTERS OF OREGON

Salem, Feb. 26.—With the filing of the last of the arguments upon the initiative and referendum measures yesterday, it has become possible to compute approximately the size of the pamphlets for the information of voters. S. A. Kozar, chief clerk of the secretary of state's office, today measured the material to be included in the book and concluded that the copies of the bills, amendments and arguments will occupy 120 pages at least. The cost will be about \$50 per page, or \$6000. As persons who file arguments must pay their proportionate share of the total cost, about \$2850 has been paid by private individuals.

### Copy for Each Voter.

The pamphlets will be published and ready for distribution about the first of April, or two months before the people will be called upon to vote upon the measures. Secretary of State Benson is now securing lists of voters who have registered in each of the counties of the state and has clerks at work addressing envelopes to these voters. When the pamphlets have been printed they will be slipped into the envelopes and mailed.

### State Printer Dunway will try to save the state \$1000 in postage by shaving the pamphlets a little closer on the edges when he trims them.

It is expected that the postage on each pamphlet will be five cents, or \$5000 on the whole 100,000 copies. Mr. Dunway thinks that by trimming the pamphlets to a slightly smaller size than the law specifies he can make the pamphlets light enough to go for four cents each.

### Mailed Soon as Printed.

The work of getting out the pamphlets is being rushed. In the meantime it is useless for voters to make inquiries. The most they can do is to register and then await the coming of a copy of the pamphlet when the printing has been completed.

### POLITICAL POINTS

Senator Bourne is said still to have the inside track with President Roosevelt and is still pushing Chris Scheibel for the district attorneyship in Oregon. The senator's prize offer of \$1000 for the best essay of the advisability of electing President Roosevelt to a third term is said to have proven a fizzle.

Ex-Senator Fred Mulkey is still at Washington, where it is said he is flirting with Bourne and "knocking" Fulton. This state of affairs has led to the report that Mulkey may yet return to Oregon and become a State-meat No. 1 candidate against Fulton, backed by Bourne's influence.

### PURCHASERS ALSO MAY LOSE LANDS IN S. P. GRANT

Buyers of railroad grant lands from the Oregon & California may be attacked, as well as the railroad company, under the Fulton resolution, authorizing the attorney-general to begin suits to enforce the compliance with the terms of the grants—namely, that the lands shall be sold for \$2.50 an acre in lots of not more than 160 acres to each purchaser, and to actual settlers only.

### This double authority conferred on the department of justice by the resolution greatly concerns holders of the lands, who have obtained their tracts from the railroad in violation of these terms.

Nearly 100,000 acres have been sold by the railroad in violation of these terms, and much of these lands contain the most valuable timber in the state. The possessors have sustained themselves with the belief that the courts will regard them as innocent purchasers. But the government will contend that it was the business of the buyers to know the restrictions placed by congress on the sale of the lands, that many of them bought from the railroad before the government had issued patents, and that deeds violating the terms of the grants cannot convey title and are void.

### Wording Is Broad.

The wording of the Fulton resolution is broad, and authorizes the attorney-general to institute practically any suits that he may deem expedient, "including the claim on behalf of the government that the lands granted by each of said acts respectively, or any part thereof, have been and are hereby forfeited to the United States by reason of any breaches or violations of any of the terms or conditions of either or any of the said acts."

The resolution also authorizes the attorney-general to institute suits to ascertain the rights of the United States as to the lands granted to the Coos Bay Wagon Road Company for a wagon road from Roseburg to Coos Bay. By the terms of that grant the lands were to be sold for not more than \$2.50 an acre and in lots of not more than 160 acres to each purchaser.

These restrictions have been violated like those attached to the railroad lands, by sale in bulk and at higher prices than \$2.50 an acre and by refusal of the company to sell to applicants for land at \$2.50 an acre.

Just its grant. He explained a law under which the grant was made and pointed out wherein the railroad company had failed to comply with the law. He told the committee the department of justice does feel justified in proceeding with suit until it is specifically authorized to do so by congress. At the conclusion of Hawley's talk the resolution was referred to the subcommittee for investigation.
