

## ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE SHAH OF PERSIA FAILS

Feb. 28.—An attempt was made today to assassinate the Shah of Persia with a bomb, but his escape was unhurt. Three guards accompanying him were killed.

The Shah was proceeding to a neighboring town when two bombs exploded in the air and the other exploded near the automobile, killing several bystanders and injuring the chauffeur and a score of the automobile. The Shah was not in the machine, but he took the precaution to send himself riding in a carriage, and later returned to the palace when the bomb from which the arrests were made.

## O. R. & N. PAYS OVEREIGHT MILLIONS IN DIVIDENDS

New York, Feb. 28.—An extra dividend of \$75 a share on preferred stock, calling for the disbursement of \$8,250,000, was declared by the Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company today. Of the company's \$11,000,000 of preferred stock the Union Pacific and its auxiliaries own \$10,993,990, Union Pacific and auxiliaries also practically own all the Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company's \$24,000,000 of common stock.

## LUMBERMEN'S MUTUAL COMPANY REDUCES RATES

Tacoma, Feb. 28.—The second day's session of the convention of the Western Retail Lumbermen's Association opened today with a meeting of the Lumbermen's Mutual Association, a co-operative fire insurance company, consisting of members of the Association. President Hilliard, of Tekoa, Washington, reported the association in a prosperous condition and stated that the cost of fire insurance to members had been reduced from 15 to 62 per cent during the four years of its existence, and that it was now furnishing insurance for about 50 per cent less than the rates of the old line companies.

F. H. Hilliard was re-elected president; J. C. Wester, of Postville, vice president; A. L. Porter, of Spokane, secretary and treasurer.

Portland, Feb. 28.—Horace G. McKinley, convicted of land frauds, was today sentenced to two years in the county jail and to pay a fine of \$7,500.

## LEADER OF FORTY THIEVES SHOT TO DEATH

New York, Feb. 28.—In a desperate battle with four men who attempted to rob him in his saloon on East Twenty-fourth street early today, Thomas Craven shot one of the robbers dead and put the others to flight. Then, in a panic, fearing the killing would mean a long term of imprisonment, Craven hid the body in the hallway outside of the saloon. He was taken into custody an hour later, and first denied the killing, but finally made a full confession. Three of the robbers are also under arrest.

The man killed was known as "Scar" Kelly, and is believed to have been a leader of a gang known as the "Forty Thieves."

## NORTHERN PACIFIC COMPLIES WITH LAW

St. Paul, Feb. 28.—There will be no reduction in the salaries of Northern Pacific telegraphers. The Northern Pacific will comply with the federal nine-hour law, but the operators will work nine hours and will not be allowed the meal hour.

## BRADLEY WINS SENATORSHIP WITH DEMOCRATIC VOTES

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 28.—Ex-Governor Bradley (Rep.) was today elected senator, receiving 64 votes. Four Democrats voted for Bradley.

Wild scenes followed the announcement of election, the Democrats demanding a re-captulation of the vote. The deadlock caused by the refusal of several Democrats to vote for Governor Beckham, the caucus nominee, had deadlocked both houses since the beginning of the session.

## MUST NAME NEW MAN FOR POSITION

Washington, Feb. 27.—"Wanted, an experienced and capable man to fill the office of district attorney of Oregon; one who can pass muster, Corporation attorneys and counsel for land fraud defendants need not apply."

A placard has again been hung on the administration door knob and the Oregon delegation will once more undertake to pick a man who can resist W. C. Bristol.

Objections to Cleeton. Senator Fulton called at the White House this morning to present C. A. Johns, of Baker City, and the president informed him that he could not see his way clear to appoint Thomas J. Cleeton. His objection to Mr. Cleeton, he said, was not on personal grounds; there was nothing whatsoever against his character, but Mr. Cleeton's past political activities made it unwise in the mind of the president and attorney-general to give him the district-attorneyship. The president asked Mr. Fulton to inform the delegation that he would like to have another name sent in. Mr. Fulton did so this afternoon, and within a day or two the delegation will meet and endeavor to agree upon some new man for this appointment. No arrangement has yet been made, however. The next name presented, it is understood, must be that of some one as yet not considered for the place.

The priest fell back and I heard everybody jumping up. I being in a strong place to me, was struck and ran out."
