A NEW METAL FOUND IN BOHEMIA MINING DISTRICT

RECENT ANALYSIS OF ORES IN CRYSTAL MINE ASSURES GREAT VALUE IN VANADIUM—MORE SNOW THIS WINTER IN DISTRICT THAN USUAL

Recent analysis of ores in the Crystal Mining Company's tunnels, Bohemia, has been productive of most happy results to the stockholders.

All through the workings of the Crystal mine a quality of ore the character of which the operators were unfamiliar, was discovered. Not until recently was the identity of this ore proven to the management.

It now develops that the mine is immensely rich in vanadium, mineral resembling ammonium lead, but far more valuable. It is said to be worth \$200 to the ton.

This mineral is found throughout the many workings of the mine in considerable quantities, but in most prominence in tunnel No. 3, where great bodies are said to be in evidence.

No authentic information is at hand as to the management's immediate plans, but it is understood that active operations will commence in the near future.

LUMBER ITEMS FROM COTTAGE GROVE

J. H. Chambers at present is operating his Alca mill on full time. He is cutting long timbers which go to Wisconsin. Long timbers and clear finishing lumber is all that can get into the lake states because of the existing rates. Oregon has no monopoly of long lumber, but Oregon and Washington together make very near monopolizing the market. Not long ago a Portland mill sent some 30-inch square timbers to Panama. They were to be used in bridges.

New Shingle Mill
S. K. Lewis is installing a shingle mill, bought from the Wayne Hardware Company, on Mosby creek about three miles from Cottage Grove. The capacity of the mill is 20,000 shingles per day. Lewis is in a fine body of cedar and his shingles will be "A" grade. In addition to shingles his machinery is adapted to making fruit boxes. The power to drive the mill is steam. Transportation to the railroad at Cottage Grove will be by primitive conveyance, horses drawing wagons.—Cottage Grove Western Oregon.

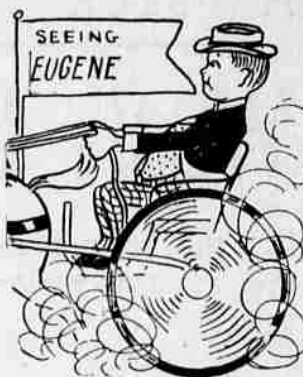
