MANY ANSWERS TO EUGENE ADS IN EASTERN PAPERS

The Commercial Club of Eugene placed an ad in several Sunday papers published in different cities of the Middle West last Sunday, and at this morning's mail alone there were received 63 letters in reply to the ads. This is a remarkable record for so short a time, and it is expected that many more letters will be coming in during the next few days in answer to these ads. They will be carried in these papers during March and April, or during the existence of the colonial rates on the transcontinental railroads. The force at the promotion department of the club has been busy all day today answering the letters received. A personal letter is written to each person, besides sending them literature that the club has on hand. However, good illustrated literature is scarce, and the club will soon have to get out something attractive to send to prospective settlers.

Ira Tanton was down from Marcola the first of the week, the S. P. mills at that place having closed down for a short time at least. Mr. Tanton moved his family to Marcola, where they will probably reside for some time.

Mrs. G. E. McCulloch went to Eugene the first of the week for a short visit with numerous relatives and friends. She was accompanied to Eugene by Mrs. F. Long, who had been here for a short visit with her and many other relatives and friends.

S. M. Harris has sold his place southeast of this city to P. B. Lerwell, and he will move thereto shortly. Mr. Harris and his son, E. W. Harris, will move to the May & Senlers farm, near Rowland.

One can hardly realize that a good-sized hog in this part of the world is worth as much as a beef steer, but if the hog is large enough it will surely bring the money. This week J. B. Hayworth sold a hog to a Coburg butcher which weighed dressed 419 pounds and received six cents per pound for the porker. This particular hog would not have been two years old until next May, and was raised on his farm above this city.

Such items as this one go a long way toward proving that farmers in this locality do not have to depend upon grain raising for a livelihood, and a few hogs, a number of sheep, and a few milk cows and some chickens go a long way towards making the Willamette Valley farmer the most independent man on the face of the globe.

For the past three weeks there has been a number of cases of small-pox in this city, but the cases have been confined to the Huddleston family, and on account of the strict quarantine enforced by Dr. Wm. H. Dale no other cases have developed within the city, although there were a number of cases on the west side of the river and one a few miles south of the city. Wherever the cases have shown up the premises have been quarantined, and as an extra precaution all the school children were vaccinated and this week school has been dismissed, but so far there is not another case. There is hardly any likelihood of any more cases showing up in the city, and if so they will be strictly isolated, and every effort made to stamp out the disease. Much credit is due Dr. Dale and the city officials for their efforts in keeping the disease confined to one family, and while the strict quarantine is in some respects quite inconvenient it is far the best in the long run, and has in this instance kept the disease down to its original starting point. Mr. and Mrs. Huddleston failed to report the existence of the disease in their family until one of two of the children had broken out, although it is alleged that they knew that they had been exposed and had the disease. They kept one of their children in school, while other members of the family were down with the disease, and it is a great wonder that there are any more cases in town, but the quick and thorough work of Dr. Dale and the city authorities in having the school children vaccinated evidently prevented the spread of the disease.—Bulletin.
