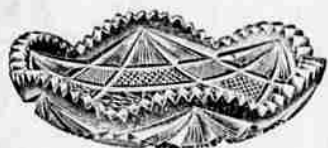

### University of Oregon News

Two hotly contested games of basketball will be played tonight at the Armory, for the Oregon first team meets the Muscatine, Iowa, Y. M. C. A. aggregation, which claims the championship of the United States, and the Senior-Sophomore team plays the Junior Freshmen five. The interest between these last two squads is greater than the rivalry of the first team, and as several past stars, and speedy youngsters, are in the line-up, the preliminary will be good.

The Muscatine team is a splendid aggregation, and has played together for four years. Last year they played fifty-eight contests, and lost five. This year, in a tour of the Atlantic states, they did even better. The team is reported a much higher class organization than even the Crescents that appeared here last year.

**Bond Goes to Seattle.**  
Jesse H. Bond, '09, was chosen in-state orator last Friday night from among five candidates, to compete in June at Seattle against the representatives of the University of Idaho and Washington. The difference between the winner and the next competitor was only two points. Bond's oration was entitled "Evolution of Character." Bond is affirmative leader on the debating squad, and won the Alumni medal.

All of the competitors did well. The winner outdistanced his nearest competitor by the narrow margin of only two points, while the third man was only three points farther down the list.

The winner was chosen by two sets of judges. Those on composition were Prof. A. R. Baldwin, of the Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis; Dr. Chapman of the Morning Oregonian, Portland; and Judge Lawrence T. Harris, of Eugene. The judges on delivery were Dr. W. Kaykendall, Judge E. O. Potter, and City School Superintendent Alderman, all of Eugene. Thos. R. Townsend, '09, presided and introduced the orators.

**Baseball Talk.**  
The baseball prospects are especially good this year. Dr. Leonard, of the faculty, having been chosen coach, Leonard caught for the University of Michigan nine in his own college days, and in practice last year demonstrated that he had a well founded knowledge of the game. The practice ground will be on the campus, where it was last year, according to Captain Hathaway, and work on it will begin at once.

There are a number of new men to try out for the team, besides the strong second nine of last year. All the former players are in college, with the exception of Beck, Johnson, Kelly and Sid Smith. Looking over the men this year, one would judge that the team will be a harder hitting nine than last year's.

**Freshmen Won Relay.**  
The Freshmen won the five-mile relay Saturday in the fast time of 25 minutes and 3-4. The best heat was made by Sievers, the Freshman last lap man, in 4:45. The Sophomores came in second, and Juniors last. The race from the start to finish was as pretty a battle of endurance as has ever been seen on Kincaid field. The Sophomores started out strong in the lead, but the last three members of the Freshmen team made up the distance, with honors about even between the three individuals. Each man of the winning five will receive a gold medal.

The men of the winning team, in the order they ran were: Mott, Hoover, May, Downs, and Sievers. Sophomores: Damm, Jamieson, Riddell, Williams, Dodson and Lewis. Junior team: Reed, Sullivan, Bond, Platte, and Wood.

The Oregon Weekly presents the following facts of Robert W. Forbes, who coaches the Oregon eleven next fall:  
The complete record of the facts is as follows: Mr. Forbes played guard and tackle at Wesleyan University in 1902 and 1903. Wesleyan is located at Middletown, Connecticut, and is not Ohio Wesleyan. Coach Forbes was elected captain of his team for 1904; but did not return to college. Instead he entered Yale, where the one-year residence rule prevented him playing during his first year in college, and he therefore made only the "scrub" eleven. In 1905 he played tackle on the Yale Varsity. During this year he made Walter Camp's All-American second team; but was a first team man in many other selections. In 1906 Forbes played end on the Yale eleven and made Camp's All-American first team as well as the majority of theoretical eleven picked by other critics. He graduated from Yale in 1907 and in the same fall coached the West Point eleven. Thus it can be seen that he has both played and coached one year under the new rules. Mr. Forbes is a member of the Delta Kappa Epsilon Fraternity.
