## ROWDYISM AT THEATRE WILL BE STOPPED

### MANAGEMENT SAYS STUDENTS OR ANY ONE ELSE WILL BE ARRESTED IF DISTURBANCE OF LAST NIGHT IS REPEATED

There was considerable rowdyism among some of the students in the gallery at the senior play at the theatre last night, which has become the subject for investigation by the faculty and which may yet possibly lead to a number of arrests. During the rendition of the play a number of students threw vegetables at the players on the stage, created a disturbance by yelling at the different members of the cast, and made themselves obnoxious in other ways. The management of the theatre threatened the boys with arrest, and today talked of taking such action yet, but it is urged that he will leave the matter with the faculty, which is making an investigation and will probably make an example of some of the offenders. The management of the theatre is determined to preserve order at all performances and will cause the arrest of any and all persons who again create such a disturbance as was created last night.

## CRESWELL LIGHT PLANT READY TO OPERATE

Andy Nelson came up last Monday from John Tunell's mill near Creswell, where he has been for the last month installing a 600-light dynamo. Mr. Tunell has power running to waste. The machine is a two-phase dynamo, same type as the one used here. The transmission line is two miles long to Creswell, and the current is raised to 2300 volts. Creswell is to be lighted and the farm houses along the line. It is thought now that the current will be turned on by Saturday evening. Workmen have been busy the past week wiring the residences and business houses of Creswell, and in addition to lights Mr. Tunell will be prepared to furnish current for motors. He has water that can develop 150 horse power, though that will not be needed at present. His water wheels are the best class of turbines—Cottage Grove Western Oregon.

## SENIOR PLAY DREW CROWDED HOUSE

A capacity house at the Eugene theatre last night testified to the confidence that the people of Eugene have in the ability of the Senior class to entertain. That this confidence was not misplaced was shown in the frequent outbursts of applause that greeted the efforts of the collegians. In some instances the demonstration amounted almost to an ovation and the recipients were forced to bow acknowledgment before the performance could proceed.

The play was "The Rivals," and was the most ambitious attempt in a histrionic way ever credited to a Senior class in the state varsity. The development of the plot was unfolded clearly and at no time was the unity of the play confused by the bits of incidental comedy with which the play abounds. The costuming had been most carefully looked after and if any details were missing they were not noticeable. The acting was natural, easy, and at times extremely clever. In fact, judging from the standpoint of college dramatic efforts, if there was anything to mar the smoothness of the most excellent college theatricals is due to causes for which the actors and director were not responsible.

Probably Webster Kincaid created the greatest enthusiasm in his impersonation of Sir Anthony Absolute. His acting was remarkably good, so good it would be difficult to believe, without positive knowledge, that this was Mr. Kincaid's first appearance of the kind.

Mr. Ramp made a good Bob Acres, keeping well in the character all of the time, and Miss Van Waters as Mrs. Malaprop convulsed the audience with her ridiculous linguistic exploits.

Mr. Neal and Mr. Huntington played the parts of Sir Lucius exceptionally well and Misses Bryant, VanDyke and Robinson and Messrs. Dill and Farnset, with good conceptions of their parts and consistent portrayal of them, filled out as strong a cast as any varsity Senior class of former years can boast.
