LAW ON WEARING

G. A. R. BADGES

UNLAWFUL TO WEAR BADGES OR BUTTONS OF ORGANIZATIONS FOR FRAUDULENT PURPOSES.

Notice to Civil War Veterans:—Extract from the Laws of Oregon reads as follows: Chap. 8, Sec. 1971. Any person who shall willfully wear the badge or button of the Grand Army of the Republic or who shall use or wear the same to obtain aid or assistance thereby, within this state, unless he shall be entitled to use or wear the same under the rules and regulations of the department of Oregon, Grand Army of the Republic, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be punished by imprisonment for a term not to exceed thirty days in the county jail or a fine not to exceed twenty dollars or by both such fine or imprisonment.

Sec. 5, Article 9, Rules and Regulations of the Grand Army of the Republic reads as follows: No person shall be entitled to wear the badge or button of the G. A. R. unless he is a member in good standing of the Grand Army of the Republic.

Many former members of the G. A. R. continue to wear the badge and button of the Grand Army of the Republic in violation of this plain and positive law. Many instances are on record where the good name of the Grand Army of the Republic has been brought into disrepute by this class of self-styled Grand Army men. Therefore J. W. Geary Post No. 7, Department of Oregon, Grand Army of the Republic, at a regular meeting held February 22, 1908, adopted a resolution instructing the post commander, through the post adjutant, to make known through the press or otherwise to all such violators of the law, that unless the illegal wearing of the badge or button of the Grand Army of the Republic was at once discontinued that action under the law would be taken against such persons. Of this warning let all concerned take due notice and be governed accordingly.
