DAIRMEN OF LOWER SIUSLAW ORGANIZE

PROPOSITIONS FROM CORVALLIS AND MONROE CREAMERIES RECEIVED FOR BUTTER FAT

Last Saturday most of the dairymen of this vicinity met at Cassady hall for the purpose of organizing a dairymen's association, says the Florence West.

W. R. Jephcott presided and R. Hinsley acted as secretary. The committee which was appointed two weeks previous to prepare a constitution presented its report, which was adopted with a few minor changes, as the constitution of the association.

About twenty of those present then signed the constitution and paid the membership fee.

The election of a board of five directors was declared in order. This board will have full charge of the business of the association, with authority to hire and discharge employees, and attend to selling cream. A vote being taken, Richard Hinsley, E. R. McCormack, W. R. Jephcott, M. D. Scott and Rufus Johnson were declared elected directors.

A letter from the Corvallis Creamery Company was then read, in which that company offered to pay for butter fat delivered at Corvallis the same price per pound as butter is worth l. o. b. at Corvallis.

The Monroe Creamery Company submitted a proposition that they would pay for butter fat, delivered at Monroe, the highest market price that butter sells for at Portland.

The meeting then adjourned. The board of directors then met and organized by electing E. R. McCormack president and Richard Hinsley secretary. The directors are taking steps to arrange for selling cream for the association and delivering it at the creamery.

RESOLUTIONS FOR UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

HOP CROP OF 1907 UNSOLD IN OREGON

From authentic statements recently compiled it is learned that the hop crop of Oregon for 1907 was 140,000 bales, and that there are still 38,348 bales in the hands of growers and 19,000 in the hands of dealers. Brewers are not buying heavily now, as most of them have sufficient supply on hand, and the temperance wave which is prevalent in many sections of the United States is effecting the beer output. Prices range from 3 1/2 to 6 cents, the latter price being for choice quality.

Reduce Acreage.

The board of Oregon directors of the Pacific Coast Hop Growers' Union has received advices from the California directors that that organization has decided to reduce the hop acreage in that state 30 per cent this season, and the plan is fully endorsed by the growers.

Similar action has also been taken by the Washington growers. It is thought that a majority of the growers in Oregon are in favor of this action, and it is generally recognized that it will not do to produce another crop this year as large as that of 1907.
