SUCCESSFUL BENEVOLENT OFFERING AT M. E. CHURCH

Sunday was one of the great days at the Methodist church in Eugene. The pastor, Dr. Trimble, spoke on the Methodist church history, government and growth. It is the greatest protestant church in the English-speaking world. It has 6,551,000 members in the United States, and has almost four times as many members as any other protestant church in the United States. There was a gain in its membership last year of 122,000, a gain of 19 per cent in the five years. In 1899 the M. E. church had 65,000 members, so the church has grown 100 fold in the last century. Its church government is perfectly in harmony with its rapid growth and next to God. The Methodist church has believed in these United States and has anticipated its development from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Last year this great church dedicated nearly three church buildings a day. Sunday the sum of \$686 was collected in a few minutes, for different benevolences of the church. It was one of the briskest collections in the history of the church in Eugene. This church led Oregon Methodism last year in benevolences, giving some \$300 for that purpose. The house was full Sunday evening to hear the fifth of the series of sermons on "Basal Hoop for Eugene." This series has aroused a wide interest.

NEWS NOTES

The Muscatine, Iowa, basketball team defeated the O. A. C. team at Corvallis Saturday night 32 to 27.

Tillmon Ford, of Salem, one of the best known lawyers of Oregon, died Sunday afternoon after an illness of three weeks of paralysis.

At Portland Sunday night Henry Shaffer, a longshoreman, was killed in his own home at the birthday party in honor of his wife by Policeman Nathan H. Suttler. It seems that the guests made so much noise the neighbors summoned an officer and the latter quarreled with Shaffer, the shooting being the outcome.

A four-hour fire destroyed the northern part of the city of Tampa, Florida, Sunday, burning over 55 acres. Loss, \$600,000.

The Republican mass convention in Portland Saturday resulted in a compromise resolution on Statement No. 1, although the friends of that section of the primary law were in the majority. An entire day was spent in wrangling.

That there exists in Portland a branch of the famous Black Hand society, which takes its name from the sable sign placed on notes intended to extort money from the wealthy, and on pieces of paper left pinned to the clothing of victims of its vengeance, is the belief of District Attorney Manning and of other officials, as well as of reputable members of the Portland Telegram.

The Good Citizenship League of Salem has begun its active campaign for local option in Marion county at the coming election. Plans are being perfected for the forming of two districts, each containing about five precincts. The first of these districts will include Turner, Jefferson, Stayton, Suburbanity and one or two other precincts. District No. 2 will be made up principally of Silverton, North Silverton and Scott's Mills.

A plague of Itch has broken out among the students of the Tacoma high school and more than 100 have the malady in a bad form. The contagion is spreading to other schools and physicians have been unable to cope with it. A number of professors and teachers are also afflicted with the desire to scratch.
