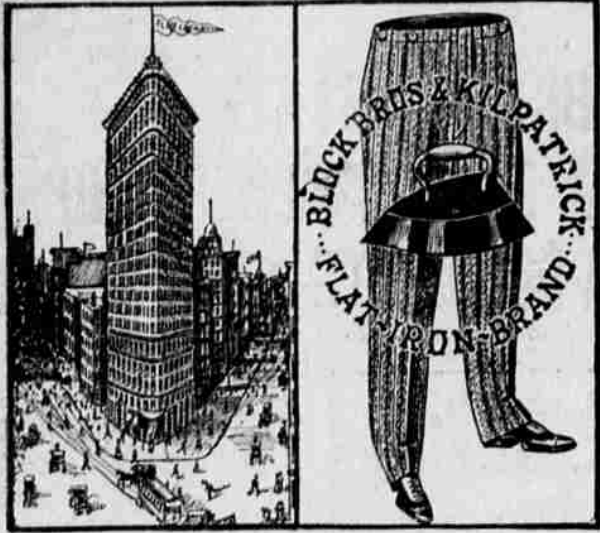

LENTEN RULES TO BE OBSERVED BY CATHOLICS

Following are the Lenten regulations for Catholics, issued by Archbishop Christie and Bishop O'Reilly, of Baker City:

Lent begins March 4. All the faithful not legitimately dispensed are obliged in conscience to observe the laws of the church concerning the Lenten fast.

1. The use of flesh meats is allowed at every meal on Sundays, as well as the principal meat on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. Saturdays of the ember days and holy week excepted.

2. The use of fish, milk, butter and eggs is permitted on all days of Lent at the evening collation and the principal meals on those days on which the use of flesh meats is forbidden.

3. In the morning a small piece of bread is allowed with a cup of coffee, tea, chocolate or some similar drink.

4. When the principal meal cannot be taken before noon, the order may be inverted and collation taken in the morning and the dinner in the evening.

5. Lard or grease can be used in preparing the lawful viaticals.

6. Those of the faith who are exempt from the obligation of fasting can, on the days when the use of flesh meats is permitted to all of the faithful, be allowed to use it several times a day, as on the Sundays of Lent, when the obligation is not binding. The use of both flesh meat and fish together at the same meal is strictly forbidden during the whole of Lent.

7. By virtue of the indulgence granted for 10 years by the holy see to the bishops of the United States, workmen and their families are allowed the use of fish meat on all the fast and abstinence days throughout the year, with the exception of all Fridays, Ash Wednesday, the Wednesday and Saturday of holy week and the vigil of Christmas. Those who avail themselves of this dispensation are not allowed to eat fish and meat at the same meal, and they are exhorted to perform some other acts of mortification and penance, in accord with the spirit of the holy season of Lent. A most useful and commendable custom is that of abstaining during Lent from stimulants in favor of the sacred chalice of our abstinence.

The following persons are exempt from fasting: All those who have not attained their twenty-first year or who have passed their sixtieth year; those whose weak health or condition otherwise may demand the full amount of nourishment, and all those whose occupations are of a laborious and exhausting nature.

Those who are excused from fasting, on account of age or hard labor, may use flesh meat more than once on the days on which it is allowed.

It is eminently in accordance with the spirit of the church that all those who use the dispensations from the fast and abstinence should supply, in part, the spirit of penance, by prayers and alms deeds; by avoiding all public shows, parties and amusements and by abstaining from all intoxicating beverages.

The time for making Easter communion extends from the first Sunday in Lent to Trinity Sunday, inclusive. All the faithful are hereby warned that all those who neglect to make the Easter communion violate a law of the church which binds under pain of mortal sin. The transgressors of the law are, moreover, subject to excommunication, and should they die, to privation of Christian burial.

Parents have to answer to God for their children. Let them, therefore, remember that they are obliged in conscience to see that their children and others under their charge receive Easter Communion.

The reverend rectors are requested to have special Lenten devotions on Wednesdays and Fridays. The exercises shall consist of the beads, instruction and benediction on Wednesdays and the way of the cross and benediction on Friday.

During the month of March the authorized prayer to St. Joseph will be recited after the usual prayers for the mass.

We also request the reverend clergy to read to the people, in the vernacular, the gospel for each day during Lent, and that this be done at the holy mass every morning.

MADAME LILLIAN BLAUVELT TO SING

Madame Lillian Blauvelt, eminent as a concert singer, grand opera artist and peculiar of the grand opera stage, has finally accepted an offer to sing at Covent Garden, London, during next season in grand opera. It had been her intention to make a farewell tour of America last year, but owing to pressing engagements in comic opera in New York, she was compelled to postpone her transatlantic tour until this season.

Madame Blauvelt has surrounded herself with an excellent concert company, including the well known cellist, Benjamin Rosenthal, of New York. His obligate work adds much to the enjoyment of the Blauvelt numbers.

Lillian Blauvelt is probably better known to the music lovers of America as a concert singer. For six seasons she has appeared regularly at the Worcester festival, and is always chosen as soloist at the Maine festival, and has appeared with all of the well-known orchestras in the east, and has probably more friends among the followers of good music than any other singer before the public.

Blauvelt is a dainty singer and a superb dresser, and has been most successful among the American singers who sought fame in Europe. She has appeared in all the capitals and in all the leading operas, old and new. Her present tour is from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and will end in May, when she goes abroad to sing for three years in grand opera in London, Berlin and Vienna.

She will visit this city on March 12, and will sing under the auspices of the U. of O. School of Music at the Eugene theatre.

DUNBAR MAY HAVE TAKEN IN \$100,000

Salem, March 3.—Secretary of State Benson, in the Dunbar case today, testified that the total number of articles of incorporation filed prior to the act of 1903, during Dunbar's term of office, was 2561, for each of which he is supposed to have received a fee of \$2.50, making a total of \$7400; \$593 notary certificates were issued during the eight-year period, which at \$2 each would make a total of \$11,160, and the amount received for copying the laws and journals during the eight years was \$11,684.75. This would make an aggregate of \$36,244.75, but does not include the fees received for registering 514 trademarks and brands. It is not known the exact amount of fees received for the latter. The fees received as ex officio insurance commissioner was the principal item of revenues to the secretary before the flat salary law went into effect, and the amount of fees he is alleged to have collected and failed to turn over to the state may reach the estimated \$100,000 mark. Court adjourned at 12 o'clock until 9 tomorrow morning.
