CITY NEWS

The program changes tonight at the Orpheum.
Another carload of brick for Louis Sherman arrived last night from Roseburg.

Household goods for Lew Kester arrived here yesterday from Carlton, Yamhill county.

The famous old play, "The Black Crook," will appear at the Eugene theatre March 13.

A marriage license was granted yesterday to Frank U. Fuller, aged 22, and Miss Lulu Pearl Haynes, aged 18, both of Eugene.

The Eugene Lumber Company today shipped a carload of lumber for Sisson, Cal., the first shipment out for several weeks.

A marriage license was issued today to George C. Coad, aged 23 and residing at Portland, and Miss Christina Nielsen, 20, of Junction.

The old depot is now on its way to its new location. It was moved the required distance south to avoid the pole which holds all the telegraph wires this morning and late afternoon on its way west across the street.

George W. Taylor yesterday received his well-drilling plant and he will at once engage in the business of securing pure water for the people of Eugene. The plant is a first-class one and will sink a splendid well in a hurry.

The foundation of the old Smith & Hill warehouse on the depot grounds is being strengthened and will be used as a freight depot by the railroad company until the old freight depot is moved to where it is to permanently stand.

A carload of rails for the new passing track now being built at the depot arrived this morning. The track will be 2000 feet long, extending from Pearl street west to a point past Jefferson street. The north freight track will be extended west to Lincoln street.

The Lane County Horticultural Society meets in Frank's hall March 7 at 2 p. m. Don't miss it. M. O. Lowndale is going to make a plea for "The Old Apple Orchard, a Quick and Sure Way to Make It Profitable." Mr. Lowndale's orchards at LaFayette are among the largest in the county.

Builders say that brick is very scarce in the valley and is feared that not enough for the contemplated business blocks in Eugene for this summer can be had. W. O. Cook, the local manufacturer of brick, is working his plant to its full capacity, but he will be able to supply only a small portion of the brick wanted.

R. G. Galbraith, of Corvallis, a newcomer to Oregon, is building a boat to run on the Willamette river and will endeavor to make the run as far south as Eugene. Watson Brothers, of Albany, are building the engine. Mr. Galbraith is the inventor of a new steam boiler which has attracted considerable attention.

Upon petition of a number of citizens who agree to perform labor equivalent to different sums of money, the county court today granted the prayer of the petitioners for an appropriation of \$500 for the improvement of the McKernon road, west of Cottage Grove, the money to be expended under the direction of M. B. Stone.

The Elks gave a splendid parade on Willamette street during the noon hour today, advertising their minstrel show, which starts at the theatre tonight and Saturday night. The members of the lodge were clad in minstrel costume, consisting of drab and purple coats and black derby hats, and carried canes with purple ribbons tied around them. They were followed by the Eugene Military band.
