COPELAND'S SUBSTITUTE FOR FORMER MATERIALS. The coopers of the United States are probably suffering more at the present time for want of a supply of wood than the men of any other wood-using industry. This condition is caused largely by the great decrease in the supply of woods considered necessary for cooperage stock, and the lack of knowledge of the merits of such woods as might possibly be used as substitutes. A few years ago the cooperage manufacturers of the Pacific coast obtained their supply of timber from the East, using largely the better cooperage woods, such as white oak and elm. Recently, these manufacturers have been using, with reasonable success, various species of wood native to their immediate section. Sitka spruce is now largely used on the Pacific coast for such slack cooperage as floor, sugar, lime and bottle barrels, and light cooperage, such as beer, pickle and felder barrels, butter and cheese cooperage, buckets and pails. Recently wine barrels have been made from Sitka spruce, these being made inside with a high grade of Sitka Douglas fir is also used in some cases. Inferior grades of cooperage such as salt and other barrels, are sometimes made of white fir.
